Formal Adjournment of the Ontario Legislature.

Sir Oliver Mowat Escorted by the 48th Highlanders.

Lieutenant-Governor's Speech Refers to the University Bill, the Vote of \$1,000,000 Toward Good Roads, Encouragement of Sugar Beet Industry, Recognition of Good Service by Canadian Soldiers, and Other Doings of the Session Just Closed.

Toronto, April 15 .- The Ontario Legislature was prorogued at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

Sir Oliver Mowat, the lieutenantgovernor, who was received by a guard of honor of 100 men from the 48th Highlanders, read the speech from the throne, which was as follows: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:
