There are now good indications that the area of low pressure, which has been so long stationary over the lake region, will move away, and that the weather in Ontario will improve. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 50—58; Kamloops, 54—64; Calgary, 46—58; Edmonton, 48—64; Winnipeg, 48—52; Port Arthur, 38—62; Parry Sound, 52—58; Toronto, 42—60; Ottawa, 48—66; Montreal, 54—68; Quebec, 50—66; Halifax, 46—72.

Local temperatures—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the Observatory on Saturday, June 1, were: Highest, 58.5; lowest, 40.5. On Sunday, June 2: Highest, 54; lowest 45.5.

Today (Monday) the sun rose at 4:36 a.m., and sets at 7:53 p.m. The moon rises at 9 p.m. and sets 5:43 a.m.

A Wallaceburg dispatch says: Mr. Porter Anderson, of this place, states that he has a cow which beats the Pan-American cow, now owned by Mr. Craig, of London. Having read about two weeks ago of this cow, which gave 22 pounds 15 ounces in seven days, and tested 5.3, when 3 years old, he concluded to try his cow, with the result that it produced 225 pounds 2½ ounces in seven days, the cow being on grass in the meantime, and getting eight quarts of bran per day, this constituting its only feed. Mr. Anderson's cow, Belle of Melrose, is a pure-bred Jersey, No. 14,214, and was 6 years old last September. Its milk tested 6.9 in the month of June when it was 3 years old. He claims that he can increase the flow of milk by feeding to 40 pounds per day.
