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FRUIT DEALERS ALARMED AT INVASION OF AMERICAN TRUST

Merchants Who Refused to Deal With Agents Discriminated Against.

Inspector McCallum is face to face with a very interesting situation, one in which some well-known merchants are deeply interested. He was authorized this morning to consult the city solicitor upon a matter the like of which has never before come within the experience of the city hall authorities.

Some time ago a man came to London, the agent of a combination of American capitalists, reputedly worth \$20,000,000, who own immense banana tracts in the West India Islands and elsewhere. He went to some leading wholesale fruit dealers here and tried to do business with them. His price for bananas was from 8 to 10 cents

higher than that of the firms with which they had been dealing. When they refused to buy he is reported to have said it was all right, he'd make them buy or put them out of the banana business. One merchant thereupon requested him to go to that portion of the universe where the price of coal caustic no worry.

He left the city and returned subsequently with a carload of bananas, which he sold to a rival local concern not at an advance upon regular prices, but, it is said, for 8 or 10 cents less per bunch than they were quoted at the Atlantic seaboard—that is, less the freight from the coast to London. This firm is now in a position to undersell the firms that would not buy from the syndicate. The latter referred the case to Inspector McCallum, whom Acting Mayor Winnet authorized to-day to consult with the city solicitor.

A well-known dealer said to The Advertiser today that the local banana business amounts to \$75,000 a year.

BIG CIRCUS COMBINE

Forepaugh & Sells, Barnum & Bailey and Buffalo Bill.

Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 29.—According to Peter Sells, one of the proprietors of the Forepaugh & Sells Bros. Circus, that circus has perfected a "community of interest" with the Buffalo Bill Wild West show, and the two will appear for a month at the same place.

Sells said the three aggregations signed a contract a month ago, and henceforth they are to be managed by Barnum & Bailey company, Limited, of London, England.

"Each company," said Mr. Sells, "retains its individuality, and while in its own right there are important things agreed to. The idea is to have one of the big shows in the United States each year and one in Great Britain and one on the continent."

ATHEIST'S GIFT TO CHURCH

On Condition That Pastor and People Listen to Him Ten Hours.

New Haven, Aug. 29.—When the Rev. Royal Raymond, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Stratford, wanted to purchase property for improvements, he made an offer to his owner, Thaddeus E. Peck, who is an atheist. Mr. Peck declined the money proposition, but said he would give the land, valued at about \$500, to the church on condition that the church pay him \$30, and that the Rev. Mr. Raymond and other members of his congregation listen to him for ten hours in a public talk, during which Mr. Peck would discuss religion and morality from his point of view.

This proposition, by which Mr. Peck is willing to pay the pastor \$47 an hour to listen to him, has been accepted. The contract says that Raymond is to give respectful and careful attention and a fair audience. The contracts were drawn up by Attorney George W. Carey, one of the pillars of the church and Judge of Probate Charles H. Peck, and has been signed by both parties. The date has not been fixed.

Grand Duke Boris.

New York, Aug. 29.—Grand Duke Vladimiritch Boris, of Russia, cousin to the Czar, who is making a tour of the world with his suite, arrived here from Buffalo last night. He said he does not know how long he will stay here or what he will do, except that he will let his fancy dictate.

Regarding a visit to President Roosevelt, the duke said:

"I shall call on President Roosevelt probably about Sept. 3, at Oyster Bay. 'Experiencing' to Newport on the 14th, and probably shall sail for Europe Sept. 9, but that is uncertain at present."

Ada Gray Dead.

New York, Aug. 28.—Ada Gray, who for years played the leading role in the London and London Home for Incubables on Wednesday, and was buried today by the Actors' Fund of America, which has practiced her funeral for the last seven years. She was about 60 years of age. She first attracted attention in a stock company in Albany, where she married Charles W. Gray. He died in 1891.

Miss Gray early became associated with "East Lynne," and her success was so pronounced that she confided herself entirely to it for the rest of her career.

In 1894 Miss Gray married Charles F. Tinney, an English actor, who had come to the country to join Henry Irving's company.
