WAS'N'T STOLEN PROPERTY BUSINESS WAS LIGHT

Parcel Carried by Fleeing Man Contained a Bible.

Factory Fireman Has a Long Run in Vain.

Extension of Exemption Granted the London Rolling Mills Company.

A good story is going the rounds about a well known foreman of one of London's leading factories. The firm, it seems, has been losing goods lately in small amounts and has been endeavoring to find the culprits.

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THE CITY FATHERS TAKE SECOND CHANCE AT A CHOICE—FIRE LIMITS MATTER SETTLED.

The time of the market fire and light committee was well taken up with fire brigade and fire limits matters at the meeting last night.

Chief Roe reported that Levi Hammond, one of the recently appointed firemen, had resigned, and two of the others, J. Talbot and A. Mahon, had been unable to pass the medical examination. The chief recommended that Charles Scott, 79 Empress avenue; J. T. Robertson, Ridout street, and Robert E. Matthews, High street, be appointed to the vacancies.

The committee accepted the chief's report and recommended accordingly. The chief further reported that the examination of the engineers for the new fire engines had not taken place as yet, Engineer Simmie, of the water works, refusing to act. The committee thereupon substituted the name of Mr. Robert Angus for that of Mr. Simmie.

The chief was instructed to notify the engineers for the new fire engines to commence work at once, the pay of Wm. Allen to commence from the 15th of this month. The salary of the first engineer was fixed at \$600 a year, and the assistant engineer at \$550 a year, for the first year, with an increase the next year.

Chief Roe and Mr. Robert Angus, the inspector of the fire limits committee, wrote that they were a couple of improvements necessary in the new chemical engine
