British Soldiers Killed and 45 Injured

In a Railroad Wreck March 30, Near Barberton.

Constabulary and Native Scouts Ambushed Near Heidelberg - Boers Called to Consider a Proposal to Surrender.

Pretoria, April 1 .- Thirty-nine British soldiers were killed and 45 were injured in a railroad wreck, March 30, near Barberton, Transvaal Colony.

London, April 1.-The war office, in reporting the railroad wreck at Barberton, Transvaal Colony, merely says that it was accidental. The victims nearly all belonged to the Hampshire

## ELEVEN MEN WERE LOST Perfumes

British Ship Cambrian Prince Was Sunk

Passenger Steamer Alma.

Fogs on the Coast Cause Many Minor Shipping Disasters-St. Petersburg Chief of Police Narrowly Escaped Assassination.

London, April 1.-Eleven men were drowned as the result of a collision this morning near the Nab lightship, between the Channel passenger steamer Alma and the British ship Cambrian Prince, Capt. Owen, from Lobas De Afuera Islands, off the coast of Peru, for Antwerp. The latter sank immediately, and all of the crew perished. The Alma returned to Southampton badly damaged.

SANK IN FOUR MINUTES. The collision occurred at 2:30 a.m., during foggy weather. The Alma struck the Cambrian Princess on the starboard quarter, ripping her side wide The ship heeled over and sank in four minutes. The eleven survivors were hauled on board the Alma by means of ropes. The steamer's bows were badly stove in.

The Cambrian Princess was built at Southampton. She was of 1,275 tons net register and was owned in Liver-

London March 31.-A Stockholm, newspaper says that the Algoma commercial syndicate is recruiting emigrants in Scandinavia under somewhat extraordinary conditions, terms of the agreement practically binding them hand and foot to the syndicate. The Ottawa correspondent of the Daily Mail, telegraphing to his paper on the matter, states that Thos. Southworth, a director of the syndicate, and F. H. Clergue deny that there is the slightest truth in said charges.

THE CORONATION RITUAL. King Edward has experienced great difficulty in inducing the Archbishop of Canterbury to shorten and simplify the ritual of the coronation, which he desired should not occupy more than forty-five minutes. Dr. Temple has insistedt on retaining several ancien customs, so the ceremony will take ninety minutes. The King absolutely refuses to take communion, which caused deep chagrin to the primate, as it is likely to cause unfavorable comment, because the King is reputed to have never partaken of communion. The primate, after prolonged protest by the King, has decided that the King must submit to being annointed on the breast as well as on the forehead and chin with holy oils, and is having a slit made in the coronation robes to admit of this being done.

The bishops of Bath and Durham have insisted upon their right to support the crown on the King's head after the coronation, an assistance the King wanted to dispense with,
