BOER LEADER ASKS FOR TERMS

De Villiers Sends in Truce Flag—Steyn and Delarey Found.

Pretoria, Monday, March 31.—President Steyn and Gen. Delarey have been located, and a meeting between them and Acting President Schalkburger is expected to be arranged without further delay. It is reported that Gen. Botha will also attend the conference. Commandant Mears has sent in word that his command will abide by the decision of the Boer Government.

Commandant De Villiers, who has been operating in the Kimberley district, has sent in a flag of truce, asking for terms.

The peace movement, however, has in no way interfered with the military operations. The British are again sweeping the northwest districts of the Orange River Colony, where, it is believed, they have about a thousand of Gen. Dewet's men within the cordon.

THINK PEACE IS NEAR.

Paris, April 1.—The Journal publishes an interview with Boer Delegate Wessels on his return from the United States. He said the present negotiations are serious. "I believe and hope," he added, "that peace is drawing nearer. I do not say that an ideal, but a satisfactory peace will be secured by mutual concessions. Nevertheless, our independence must be respected." Mr. Wessels refused to define his understanding of independence. He said the Boers were indifferent regarding a standing army, but disarmament was impossible, in view of the armed natives.

Schalkburger, Reitz, Steyn and the other Boer leaders had good sense, and were of higher character. They know the resources they can still command and will act for the best interests of the Boers. It was not for the Boer representatives in Europe, sheltered from danger, to be so warlike than those fighting in the field. The Boers should be allowed to continue the fight, which would mean surrender on the terms of Louis Botha. Delarey and two-thirds of the Boers now in the field.

Military experts from South Africa now are confidently declaring that, relieved of the pressure of the Transvaalers, Lord Kitchener could and would dispose of Dewet and his men within six weeks.

ELEVEN MEN Easter WERE LOST Perfumes

British Ship Cambrian Prince Was Sunk

By Collision With the Channel Passenger Steamer Alma.

Fogs on the Coast Cause Many Minor Shipping Disasters—St. Petersburg Chief of Police Narrowly Escaped Assassination.

London, April 1.—Eleven men were drowned as the result of a collision this morning near the Nab lightship, between the Channel passenger steamer Alma and the British ship Cambrian Prince, Capt. Owen, from Lobos de Afuera Islands, off the coast of Peru, for Antwerp. The latter sank immediately, and all of the crew perished. The Alma returned to Southampton badly damaged.

SANK IN FOUR MINUTES.

The collision occurred at 2.30 a.m., during foggy weather. The Alma struck the Cambrian Prince on the starboard quarter, ripping her side wide open. The ship heeled over and sank in four minutes. The eleven survivors were hauled on board the Alma by means of ropes. The steamer's bows were badly stove in.

The Cambrian Prince was built at Southampton. She was of 1,275 tons net register and was owned in Liverpool.

Fogs on the coast have resulted in a number of minor mishaps to shipping. The French brig Russia, bound for Newfoundland, and having on board a crew of 31 men, was wrecked on the rocks west of St. Catharines, Isle of Wight. The crew were safely landed.

"STRENUOUS" TIMES IN ST. PETERSBURG.

St. Petersburg, April 1.—The police prefect of Moscow, M. Trepoft, had a narrow escape from assassination yesterday. While receiving visitors in the afternoon, he suddenly drew a revolver, placed its muzzle at the official's breast and pulled the trigger. The weapon, however, missed fire. In the subsequent excitement, the woman tried to escape, but was arrested. It is believed that the attempt was connected with the recent student troubles.

While the Mirgorod regiment was parading on the barracks square at Kief yesterday, Captain Sofronoff shot and killed Lieutenant Grodzki for maligning the former's family.

NOTHING IN IT.

London, March 31.—A Stockholm newspaper says that the Algoma commercial syndicate is recruiting emigrants in Scandinavia under somewhat extraordinary conditions, terms of the agreement excite the sympathy of the hand and foot to the syndicate.

The Ottawa correspondent of the Daily Mail, telegraphing to his paper on the matter, states that Thos. Southworth, a director of the syndicate, and P. H. Clergue deny that there is the slightest truth in said charges.

THE CORONATION RITUAL.

King Edward has experienced great difficulty in inducing the Archbishop of Canterbury to shorten and simplify the ritual of the coronation, which he desired should not occupy more than forty-five minutes. Dr. Temple has insisted on retaining several ancient customs, so the ceremony will take ninety minutes. The King absolutely refuses to take communion, which caused great chagrin to the prime minister, because the King is reputed to have never partaken of communion.

The prime minister, however, protest by the King, states that the King must submit to being anointed on the breast as well as on the forehead and chin with holy oils, and is hove a little made in the King's head.

The bishops of Bath and Durham have insisted upon their right to support the crown on the King's head after the coronation, an assistance the King wanted to dispense with.

BARMARDS DOOMED.

A blow is about to be struck at that cherished British institution, the flint-chimney, white-cuffed and aproned barmaid. From Glasgow comes intelligence that in future these rosy-checked, sharp-tongued young women shall not supply the public with whisky.

EXECUTION OF SCHEEPERS.

The charges brought by J. G. S. MacNeill, Irish Nationalist member of the House of Commons, that the execution of Commandant Scheepers by the British at Graaf Reint, Cape Colony, Jan. 18, was attended by shocking brutality, have twice before been made by Mr. MacNeill in the House of Commons. He refused to name his authority for his allegations, and Mr. Brodrick, the secretary of war, declined to have the matter investigated. Mr. MacNeill's charges have been published in the United States.

DILLON CONGRATULATED.

A dispatch to the Times from Dublin says that at a meeting of the Dublin Harbor executive of the United Irish League, it was resolved to congratulate John Dillon on his recent attack on Joseph Chamberlain, whom he called a liar. The mover of the resolution said that no words less strong would have described the Irish opinion of "Judas Chamberlain." The language expressed the contempt the Irish hold for a government carrying on a war of corruption and debauchery.
