### ENTERTAIN AND TEACH PRISONERS

Japs Organize Classes in Which Ignorant Russians Learn to Read and Write.

London, June 16 .- Japan, which has taught the world many wonderful things in the art of warfare since the beginning of hostilities with Russia, has established a new standard of magnanimity in the treatment of prisoners of war, which is rather advanced when compared with the methods followed in western civilization. Many charges of inhuman treatment of prisoners have been made against the Japanese, but authentic information received here demonstrates beyond question that the Russian captives are not only treated in a most humane manner, but that the Japanese are educating the illiterate prisoners, and are furnishing them with enter-tainment, recreation and sports, which they never enjoyed during the days of their freedom.

At Himeji City, Japan, where 3,000 Russian prisoners are detained, the Japanese have established schools for the education of the illiterates, and these unfortunates have been taught to read and write their native language. Spe-cial complimentary theatrical performances have been given for the ben-efit of the prisoners; they are granted liberty certain days in each month; are permitted to play lawn tennis and other games so as to secure necessary recreation and exercise; and the athrecreation and exercise; and the athletic women of the poli id smiling nation of the east have given special performances for the amusement of the prisoners. If any of the prisoners die he is buried with much ceremony Col.
