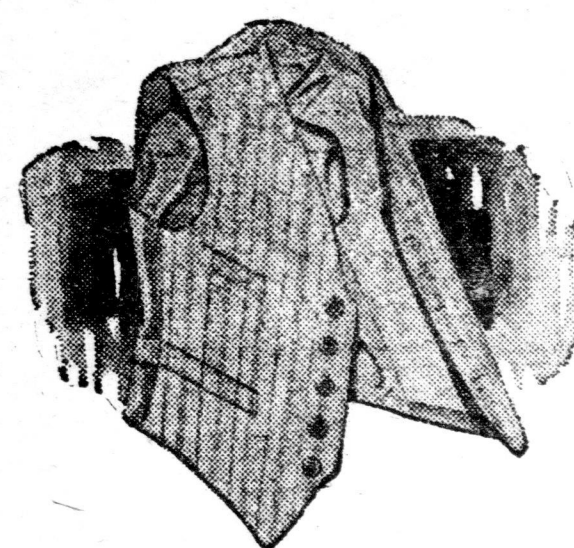

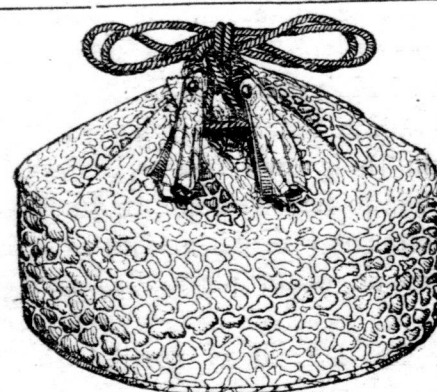

EXPERT URGES STUDY OF SOUL

Professor Muensterberg Says Colleges Must Teach Practical Psychology.

Chicago, Dec. 19.—Psychology practicalized and applied expertly in every walk of life was advocated and predicted last night by Hugo Muensterberg, professor of experimental psychology at Harvard University in addressing the Commercial Club members at their banquet in the Congress Hotel. Professor Muensterberg declared that the time was fast approaching when every university in the country would be forced to establish psychological laboratories and conduct expert classes in the subject which he considered of vast importance.

"Scientific psychology," he said, would be of great benefit to the teacher, the physician, the lawyer, the businessman, the artist, the laborer, the manufacturer, and, in fact, men in every sphere of human existence. Experi-

mental laboratories and the benefits already attained from discoveries made have been underestimated in the professor's opinion, and he sought to convince his auditors of the great importance of the subject.

Sees Danger in Misuse.

The dangers of misuse of psychology by men not scientifically familiar with the subject, Professor Muensterberg emphasized, and to safeguard against abuses, the mistakes of Christian Science in applying mind over matter, of other mind cures and "clap-trap" hypnotism, he urged the necessity of experimental scientific laboratories where men and women can be trained to thoroughly understand the subject.

"That thousands of persons are cured of indispositions and disease by Christian Science and other mind cures there is no doubt," said Professor Muensterberg. "But all these diseases are pathological. Mental suggestion cannot cure organic disease. Only such disease as mentality can affect can this be cured. Even pain can be cured and an organic disease remain. Pain is mental effect and can be overcome by suggestion according to the susceptibility of the patient. In this way there is danger in that the functional is not differentiated from the organic disease. Scientific psychology will lead to proper diagnosis of such cases to determine how the patient should be treated.

"For example, I have never in all my experiences seen a case of stammering that was cured by hypnotism, because the disease is both functional and organic. Another thing that is dangerous is overuse of suggestion, which, while curing one disease, will produce another. Reckless use of mental suggestion may produce hysteria and mental disturbances that are disastrous.

"From the religious point of view in which clergymen resort to the use of mental suggestion without a proper and thorough understanding of psychology, there is danger, because if the patient hopes for cure only in religion and is not cured he loses his religion. On the other hand, the clergyman, apt to realize that, resorts of hypnotism, to charlatanry and other clap-trap suggestion, which results disastrously, and threatens the peril that religion is drawn down to a low standard."

WOMEN TO VOTE MAY BE SOLDIERS

Suffragist in France Willing to Serve in the Army to Obtain Desire.

Paris, Dec. 19.—In English-speaking countries the only opposition to women's suffrage has been popular tradition and a certain immaturity of the women's part for civic responsibilities. But in France, aside from the usual Gallic conservatism that greets any attempts at feminine emancipation, there is another barrier. That is the compulsory army service which every voter must undergo as a component part of his citizenship.

Dr. Madeleine Pelletier, president of the Women's Solidarity League, who recently attracted considerable attention by hinting in a vague sort of way that she was ready to do military service in exchange for a vote, has followed up that statement by giving a complete exposition of her views on the interesting subject.

"Of course, the conscript service is

a logical necessity if women are granted the right to vote," she explained. "Although I am the first to proclaim my willingness for such service, there are many French women who would do likewise, only they aren't courageous enough to say so.

"I know the idea sounds ridiculous at first, but that is mainly because of its novelty. Naturally I don't mean to advocate army service without any qualifications. I don't expect women to serve in the rank and file—at least, at present. However, only two-thirds of the army is given over to active field work. The other third have much more passive duties. These duties women could perform as well as men. For instance, they could help in the manufacture of army supplies, could make uniforms and shoes. The provision department could be turned over to them and they could work in the stables and kitchens, could act as orderlies, and, of course, serve on the medical staff. Later, when popular opinion had grown more accustomed to the idea, women could serve regularly in the infantry, cavalry and artillery. They could wear uniforms like zouaves.

Would Make It Optional.

"Naturally the majority of French women, however great their civic zeal, will prefer to renounce their pretensions to the vote rather than serve. I would overcome that difficulty in this way. The vote would be granted only

to those who were willing to do their service and, as a compensation for their public spirit, certain privileges would be granted them after their term of service was over. For example, women who had served would be assured positions in the Government with a pension after so many years. They could be postmistresses, could be given charge of the tobacco shops which are under state control or could be employed as Government clerks.

"Believe me, there are many women of the lower classes—and, of course, these privileges would hardly appeal to the smart set—who have to work any way and who would be glad to serve one year with the prospect of an assured income afterward."
