

"How great will the advance be in investigation was composed of Henry the respective teas?"

"The teas which have been selling other teas which are not so much affected by the conditions I mentioned will be probably left at about where they were. We will not make any change in them ourselves, and I expect none of the wholesalers will, but as to the other teas it has been made absolutely necessary."

"Do you think the market may adjust itself later on, Mr. Larkin? "I do not think so. The conditions are against that. For years the planters had complained that they were not making money, and now that they have everything in their favor, and with the large profits they made last year from their gardens, it is unlikely that they will make any concessions.
