**CLAIMED \$1,000
JURY GAVE HIM \$25**

Newspaper Libel Case of Unusual In-
terest Decided in Berlin Court.

Berlin, Oct. 1.—A libel action of un-
usual interest to the newspaper frater-
nity and the public generally was
tried at the assizes here this morning
before Chancellor Boyd and a jury,
when Bartholomew Dingle sought to
recover \$1,000 damages from S. Steven-
son, publisher of the Chatham Planet.
The action is based on an article set
out from St. Catharines last July, re-
ferring to Mr. Dingle's negotiating for
the purchase of Michael Kane's gro-
cery store. The article, which was
widely published, subsequent events
showed to be erroneous and apologies
were promptly made. Similar actions
were instituted against the Stratford
Beacon and London Free Press, the
Brantford Courier, the Woodstock Ex-
press and the three Toronto evening
papers, but settlements were made in
all cases except the present action and
that against the Evening Telegram,
which is pending.

After the presentation of the case by
Chancellor Boyd, the jury retired and
shortly after returned a verdict award-
ing Dingle \$25. The verdict carries
costs.

JUST EMPTY SHELLS

Ethel Barrymore Says Harsh Things
of American Society Girls.

Chicago, Oct. 1.—A dispatch to the
Tribune from St. Louis, says:

"Ethel Barrymore, the actress, whose
entry into the best of American and
English society is unquestioned, made
the astonishing declaration in an in-
terview yesterday that the moralless,
brainless and purposeless order of be-
ings in the world constitute the elite
society of America. She expressed the
opinion that the reason international
marriages with American society girls
have proved a failure is because the
brides haven't enough mentality, cul-
ture, education and serious purpose to
interest the foreign noblemen or to
meet the requirements of the situation
they find there.

"There is no occasion for brains in
our society, at least not in that in
New York, which I have seen, and
consequently girls don't prepare them-
selves or cultivate their capacities.

"The woman of wealth are merely
selfish and pigish, and are merely
content with comfortable living quar-
ters, a good dinner, a little poker or
bridge, or a rapid automobile or two.
They are empty shells and perfectly
meaningless and useless to the coun-
try."

agreement will be amended, and that
the county will be asked to contribute
a little more to the support of county
patients than formerly. The expenses
of such an institution have increased
greatly during the past decade.
