Sarnia, Feb. 8.—Before a crowd of 900 people, the crack intermediate hockey team of London, defeated the Sarnia homebrews at St. Andrew's rink here tonight by 5 to 0.

The score is by no means an indication of the playing of the home team, but was due to the quick and steady combination work of the London septette.

It was nearly 8:30 when Referee Rogers, of Watford, lined the players up, and after giving them a little advice blew his whistle and the game was on.

London's Protest Allowed.

Play had only been started about three minutes when Sarnia scored the first goal. This was protested, however, as London claimed the umpire, who was standing on the ice, interfered with one of their men who was passing behind the goal with the puck, and Referee Rogers upheld them in their protest.

The players were beginning to warm up, and the puck was rushed from one end to the other, when after ten minutes, in which Mallen, of London, was ruled off for cross-checking, London scored their first goal from the face-off.

Sarnia worked hard, but were unable to get the puck past the London defence.

Half-Time Score 2 to 0.

Shortly before the whistle blew for half-time, London landed another in the net, making the score 2 to 0. Sarnia had the best of the play during the second half, but were unable to find the net, while London scored three, making the final tally 5 to 0.

The work of Bernhardt at cover and Orr and Mallen was all that could be expected in senior hockey, while for the home team Simpson in goal, Wilson at cover, and Lesueur, McLehland and Cameron all put up an excellent game.

If Ordinance Is Passed There.

Chicago, Feb. 8.—Police Chief J. J. Steward has a plan to protect young men of Chicago from horse race betting. The plan is to issue an ordinance, which makes the circulation of any pamphlet or circular containing information intended to induce anyone to bet upon a contest of skill or strength between men or animals a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of \$50 to \$200 for each offense.

The ordinance also prevents scattering of tips or information regarding places where bets may be made.

Los Angeles, Feb. 9.—Jim Flynn won a ten-round battle with Sam Langford here last night.

According to Charles Eytan, who was the referee of the contest, Flynn had the best of the fight from start to finish.

Flynn went after Langford like a demon in the first round, and had him backing up until pressed against the ropes. Langford fought back to the centre of the ring, and squaring himself, put a right on Flynn's cheek and brought blood flowing from the eye.

Throughout the fight, and repeatedly rushed into clinches.

Fireman Had Better of It.

In the second round Flynn caught Langford in the centre of the ring and wrestled him to the floor.

Langford was up instantly, fighting back, but in this exchange Flynn seemed to have the better of it.

In the third round Flynn opened a gash over Langford's right eye with a straight left.

And Langford Challenged Johnson!

The fourth, fifth and sixth rounds were all Flynn's.

In the ninth round Flynn, after receiving a hard right on the neck, retaliated with a right straight from the shoulder, which landed on Langford's sore eye.

Langford's long arms were going like flails, but he did not land. They rushed together furiously at the beginning of the tenth, but Langford was forced to break ground. The round ended without Langford having an opportunity to land any of his famous right swings. Throughout the fight Referee Eytan was repeatedly forced to separate the men.

NATIONAL BALL COMMISSION

ORDERS EVIDENCE OF KLING'S
AFFAIR IN DOCUMENTARY FORMMoguls Are Apparently Trying to Give Johnny a
Square Deal, But Will Not Make Different
Interpretations of Rules to Suit Different
Classes of Players—Howard Camnitz, of
Pittsburg, Becomes a Holdout—Miner Brown
Says He Wants No Trouble,

An extremely peculiar course has been taken by the national commission in dealing with John Kling's application for reinstatement.

Joe Flanner, formerly editor of Sporting News, now a member of President Johnson's office staff has been deputized by the national commission to make a minute examination into Kling's cause for failure to report last spring, and his association with "outlaw" clubs or players during the season. The results are to be presented to the commission in documentary form, and on the report it will base its action.

LESSER LIGHTS
WILL WATCH DEAL.

This seems to be going to some unnecessary trouble. Kling has never been soft pedal in detailing the causes of his failure to show, and the files of any Chicago newspaper will give sufficient evidence as to his baseball activities during the season. In fact, the memories of the commission members should be sufficient. However, the governing board seems to be making an effort to do the right thing. This case cannot be handled too carefully or too wisely. All of the lesser lights in baseball will watch it closely, to see whether or not there are two interpretations of the same rules for two classes of players.

STAR TWIRLERS.
MAKING TROUBLE.

Barney Dreyfus seems to be having a little trouble with the star member of his pitching string, Howard Camnitz. The latter, according to Pittsburg dispatches, has left the Smoky City in a huff, after a talk with the club president, and is on his way home. He says there is nothing doing unless the contract offered him shall be revised.

Camnitz was not a figure of any prominence in the world's series, but he loomed large in getting his club into that competition. He tied with Mathewson for the National League pitching leadership, each having 25 victories and 8 defeats marked up.

Camnitz had a little something on the New York star, in that he was in 41 games, as against 37 in which Mathewson figured.

MINER BROWN
NOT A HOLD-OUT.

Miner Brown, another National League prominence, who has been mentioned as a hold-out, claims that he is unjustly accused. Brown says that his contract doesn't suit him, and that he isn't going to do anything about it until Chance comes east, when he can arrange a triangular conference with Murphy, of course, the third party. It is said that Brown, believing that he has not a great many more years of baseball in him, is asking for a \$2,000 raise this season.

Walter Johnson is in the same boat as these two pitchers, absolutely refusing to sign at Washington's figures. As the National's only gate card, he is worth one of the biggest salaries of the league.
