Y. W. C. A. IN THRIVING CONDITION IN LONDON

Mrs. A. T. Edwards Was Re-elected President at a Meeting Held Yesterday

At the monthly meeting of the Y. W. C. A. board of directors, held yesterday afternoon, officers were elected as follows: President, Mrs. A. T. Edwards (re-elected); Mrs. F. L. Burdon, secretary.

THIRTY-TWO DEAD IN HERALD CRASH

Architect Who Altered Building Cannot Account for Accident

Montreal, June 15.—Eight more bodies were taken from the Herald building ruins today, making a total of 32, of whom 18 so far have been identified, two remaining with nothing left by which even a guess at their identity could be had.

It has now been definitely ascertained that 32 people were killed in the disaster, all the missing having been either traced or found to be amongst the dead.

At the inquest today Architect Archibald says he had prepared the plans for the alteration of the building when the Herald went in. This included the strengthening of the structure to carry the tank which on Monday plunged through to the cellar. He considered that something in the building must have given way to precipitate the tank through the roof, but he could not give any definite idea as to the exact cause.

Archibald was greatly affected when giving his testimony. The inquest was adjourned.

KING VS. INGLIS.

Ottawa, June 15.—Hearing of the case of the King vs. Inglis et al., was begun in the exchequer court before Mr. Justice Cassels this morning. It concerns the expropriation of Sussex street properties by the Government in Ottawa for the erection of the new departmental block. The peculiar thing about the case is the difference between the amount offered and the price sought to be obtained for the property in question. The crown offers \$37,000 for the land taken and for all damages arising from such expropriation. The defendants claim \$80,000. It is likely that the case will engage the attention of the court for some days.

WESTERN GRAIN CROP TO BREAK ALL RECORDS

Crop Report of C. P. R. Is Most Optimistic in Anticipating the Coming Harvest.

Winnipeg, June 15.—The C. P. R. has issued a crop report covering its widely extended system in the west, which shows, generally speaking, weather favorable and growth rapid. Of 39 sections reporting, only four sound a note of alarm. In Lethbridge section the crops are said to need rain urgently, and on the Langton branch they are suffering on account of dry weather. Calgary also reports rain needed, and the same cry comes from Souris and Medicine Hat.

All the other sections report enthusiastically in regard to favorable weather and rapid growth. From five to ten hours' rain has been the general rule. In Southern Saskatchewan, Yorkton district, Edmonton section and Moosejaw section, abundance of rain is reported, with consequent gratifying growth. Taken all round, the conditions reported on the C. P. R. system are of a very encouraging nature.

The general report for the week ending June 11 gives evidence that prospects generally are regarded as better than ever before for a record-breaking crop. The warm weather of the last week, which succeeded in tantamount spells of frost and snow, was exceedingly beneficial all round. With the exception of flax, all the seeding is completed, and the growth of crops is very favorable.

Along the main line reports in most cases are encouraging, but some points, for instance Dana, Sask., and Innisfail, Alta., report rain urgently needed. The company's agents in Manitoba report without exception weather favorable and growth rapid.

The Catholics and the Bible.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

In your issue of Monday, June 13, you publish a statement made in Talbot Street Baptist Church by A. E. White, of Montreal, "That in Montreal and throughout Quebec, the people are not allowed to read the Bible, and that the priests burn all they find in the homes." As you, Mr. Editor, have given to the public this statement of the above-named reverend minister of God, an ambassador of our faith, I would like to ask you to publish the name of the Catholic priest, or priests, the name or names of the church or churches the priest or priests serve; the name or names of the parishes; the county or counties, and the name or names of the bishop or bishops in whose dioceses the Bibles have been burned, and will Rev. Mr. White please state whether he can prove beyond cavil or doubt the truth of his words? And will he kindly publish the names of those who saw the priest or priests burn the Bibles? Were the Bibles any of those translations authorized by any Roman Catholic bishop or bishops? Or were they versions which so many people have given to the world according to their own whims and fancies?

Last Sunday week, a Rev. Mr. Graham, in the same church, said: "I don't educate in Quebec—they teach religion." Can there be anything more grand or truly necessary than religious instruction? At a convention last week in this city, the Rev. Mr. Norton, of St. Thomas, said: "The Roman Catholics are the only ones who teach religion in their school." In the Synod of Huron, held in St. Paul's Cathedral last week, a member thereof made a similar statement: "The Roman Catholics, to my knowledge, for the past 38 years, have been blamed for teaching religion in the schools." Does not teaching religion mean teaching the Bible?

A delegate in the Synod of Huron last week said: "It was through the Roman Catholics that the Bible was not read in the public schools." Another said: "It was through the Non-Confessionists. Another wanted to know who the Non-Confessionists were. Well, that man had better go away back to the old schoolhouse and learn a little English or Scotch history."

If my memory serves me correctly, it was Bishop Williams who said in his first address to the synod, that it was the Methodists, Baptists, and Presbyterians who through their jealousy of the Bible caused religion and the Bible to be kept out of the common schools. How these preachers do contradict each other! How is it they blow hot and cold? How is it they are nearly one and all tearing up the Bible and pelting each other with the scraps? Is there any part of the Bible left that has not been denied? Talk about unity, why their only bond of unity is to hate the Pope and the members of the Catholic Church; to slander, calumniate, misrepresent and bear false witness against the church and her children.

Do these preachers believe that the Catholics were left out when God said: "Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor?" Did Jesus, true God and true man, leave out the Catholics when he said: "Love thy neighbor as thyself?" Did the divine Son of the Immaculate virgin leave out the Catholics when he said: "A new commandment do I give unto you, that ye love one another? Did the eternal Son of the eternal Father leave the Catholics out when he said: 'By this shall it be known that ye are disciples, that ye love one another?' The scriptures ask 'How shall a man say that he loves God, whom he hath not seen, if he hate his brother, whom he hath seen?'"

I could give some more texts, but enough is as good as a feast. Hate for us Catholics, from the Pope down, they most certainly prove by their words—yes, and some by their acts. Well, the sin is theirs; they must answer to the Great Judge. They hurt our feelings, but, ah, they hurt their own souls and the souls of those who follow after them. I would advise every non-Catholic to purchase a five-cent catechism, read it, and compare it with the texts of the Holy Scriptures. Prove all things and hold fast to those that are good."

Again, asking you to give space to this, I am a constant reader of your excellent paper, a common laborer, and a Catholic, thank God.

the streets of London South. He draws it out. There is no pathmaster probably in the county of Middlesex that would attempt to fix or repair a road in the shilly-shally way it is being done in London South.

Stanley street is receiving, or has received, a coat of gravel lately which is a disgrace to the city authorities who are responsible for the work. Stones as large as a man's fists make the bulk of the coating. No matter how it is rolled down the first heavy load that passes over the street brings them to the surface. The sides of the street are higher than the street car tracks, and still they are putting on more. Many streets are in the same condition. On Orchard street, although built on for over 30 years, the street has never been graded, and a large gully runs ten feet onto the roadway. Many streets could be named in like condition. Who is responsible? There is no heavy teaming in that part of the city. What are the Municipal League members of the council doing? They promised to put everything in proper shape. If the mayor and a few of the city fathers would take a trip to Tillsonburg, Ont., and see the main street of that town they would get a wholesome lesson in street building. III-Gravelled Streets.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

Two points made by Dr. Ferguson, in his complaint of the discreditable condition of our streets, are well taken, viz., the presence of holes and ruts, and the size of the stones left on the streets. At this moment I examined a stone left on the road in the front of my house, and it measures 5 by 8 inches. Now, there is no excuse on the ground of economy, or any other ground, for having the roads littered with large cobblestones. These stones never will pack. They are a menace to horses, vehicles, and autos. All stones larger than a baseball should either be broken or raked off the streets.

The holes and ruts, instead of being left to deepen with every rain, and become a receptacle for mud and filth, should be filled with good gravel, not bricks or boulders.

There is no excuse why these two defects should not be remedied. Here is a pointer for road foremen. Rake off, or better, break stones that are not gravel, and you will make the streets vastly more safe and passable, and at the same time you will actually be reducing the cost of street maintenance. What the streets are in their present disgraceful condition, with stones, holes, and ruts, the street department is justly chargeable with inexcusable mismanagement and incompetence. HALIFAX URGES CHANGE IN OATH

Says It Is Time Offensive Clauses Be Removed.

London, June 16.—Speaking here before the Young Men's Union, Lord Halifax, a member of the Established Church, came out in favor of the abolition of the clauses in the accession oath which are offensive to the Roman Catholics.

"There may be an outcry in some quarters if the Government carry out its intention of bringing in a bill abolishing the declaration," he said, "but it will be an outcry of no sort of importance. The only danger that can possibly arise will be if the Government attempts to tinker with the declaration or to substitute another in its place. The only wise and reasonable course, as it is far the easiest, is to introduce a bill of one clause abolishing the declaration altogether."

The declaration is an old and effecting thing, the meaning of which very few people have any idea of, for the simple reason they have never given it a thought.

Father Bernard Vaughan, in a letter to the press, expresses the belief that the mind of the country has at last begun to consider the anti-Catholic clauses of the royal declaration in the light of common sense.

"History," he writes, "shows them to have sprung from the panic and religious rancor excited in England by the arch-perjurer, Titus Oates. Reason condemns them as wholly ineffective for their purposes, and therefore needlessly and gratuitously insulting alike to the monarch and his loyal Catholic subjects."

"The declaration, as it stands, is a painful reflection upon the intelligence of a civilized and enlightened community. If under the excitement of panic some excuse may have been found for it, none at all can be made for it now. The main point now is not whether the obnoxious clauses safeguard the Protestant succession or not, but whether the charge they convey is true. It is that which really matters.
