CITY WILL TALK JOINT BUILDINGS

Council on Thursday Night.

CITY COUNCIL IN LINE Average Figures in the Markets of To-

Matter Was Debated at Length at Special Meeting Held Last Evening.

The city council, at a special mee ing held last night, approved of the principle of joint municipal buildings, and named the whole council as a committee to interview the county council at its special session on Thurs-

day evening.

A resolution was also passed fixing the proportion the city has to pay for the erection of the building at 60 per cent and the county 40 per cent. The same ratio was adopted for maintenance. Failing to agree on terms for joint buildings, the city agreed to pay 50 per cent of the cost of alterations and repairs to the court house.

Ald. Cooper moved that the council agree to pay half the cost of the court pouse repairs.

Ald. Wilson seconded the motion.

Ald. Eckert thought that the guestion of joint buildings should be settled before the motion was introduced and moved that the city council approve of the principle of joint municipal buildings, provided that a satisfactory agreement as to cost of buildings, site, etc., could be arrived at.

Open Negotiations. A resolution was also passed fixing

to the ratepayers in the form of a plebiscite.

Mayor Beattie pointed out that this matter had been referred to the special committee, and as Aid. Morgan was a member of that committee he could bring the question up there.

This was done.

Those present were Mayor Beattle. Aid. Eckert, Richter, Bennett, Ashplant, Donnelly, Tancock, Wilson, Morgan, Mitchell, Cooper and City Clerk Baker.
