HUNDREDS STOOD FOR FIVE HOURS UP TO THEIR NECKS IN THE LAKE

Seven Bodies Have Been Found On Hollinger Trail-Ottawa Man Saved His Life by Burying His Face in the Mud--Stories of Survivors.
