

ST. THOMAS KILLED BY LIGHTNING

New Brunswick Man Died Instantly During Electric Storm.

Andover, N. B., July 5. - Charles Morris was instantly killed by lightning at California, about six miles from here, this afternoon, during one of the worst electrical storms that has been experienced in this part of the country in years. His barn was also struck and caught fire, and, with two other barns nearby, was burned to the ground with a large quantity of farm machinery. The storm started about 4 o'clock, and lasted for an hour and a half, during which time rain fell in torrents, doing great damage to crops.
