

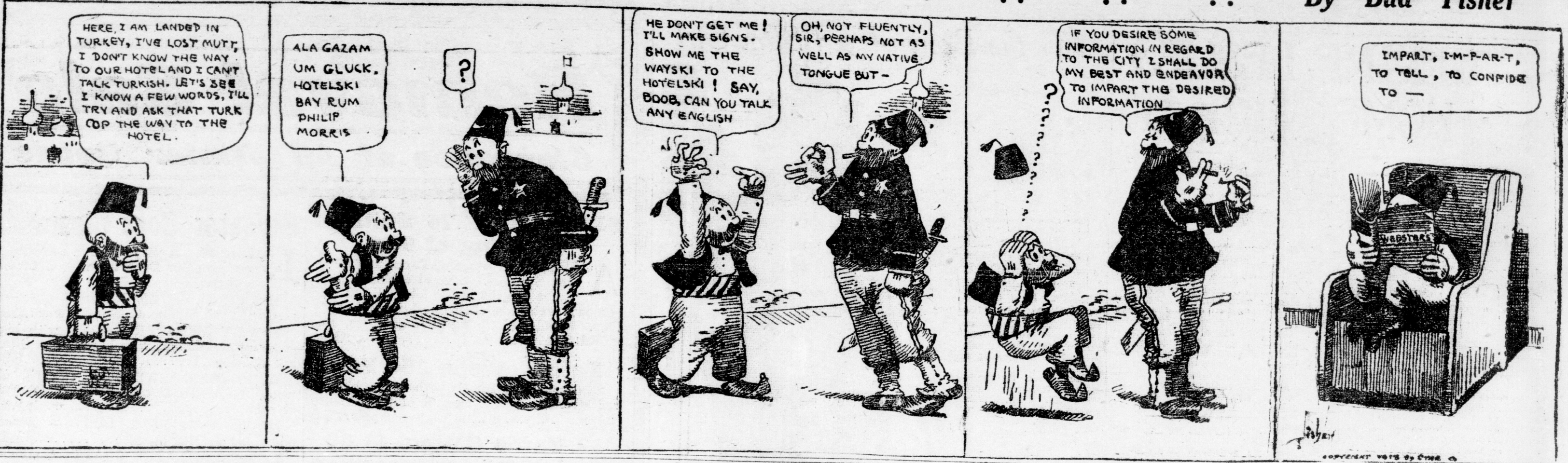

GRAND OPERA SET
RECORD AT OTTAWA

Broke the Former Track Mark on the Opening Day of the Races.

FAST TRACK PREVAILED

Perfect Weather Greets Opening of Ottawa Ice Races Before Good Crowd.

Ottawa, Jan. 30.—Perfect racing weather and a fast track prevailed for the opening events today of the Hull Driving Club meet. The feature was the lowering of the track record, formerly set at 2:15 1/4, and held by Hal Jun, to 2:14 1/4, by Grand Opera.

Forced to extend himself, in the third heat of the 2:14 pace stake, by Captain Laramie and Clara Paul, the Toronto pacer covered the mile faster than he has ever done before. It is not a Canadian record, however, as the mile was paced by Royal Gratian at Dufferin Park two weeks ago, in 2:13 and a fraction. Grand Opera won the stake in straight heats, while The Gleaner, a promising trotter, purchased by Cliff Tressider at the Old Glory sale, took down the Classified Local after four heats.

The free-for-all trot was unfinished, Monarchial Lady, owned by Faulkner, of Ottawa, capturing the first, while Margot Leonard, owned in Toronto, won the second and third. The race will be finished tomorrow. The largest crowd in the history of the track witnessed the opening day's sport. Summary:

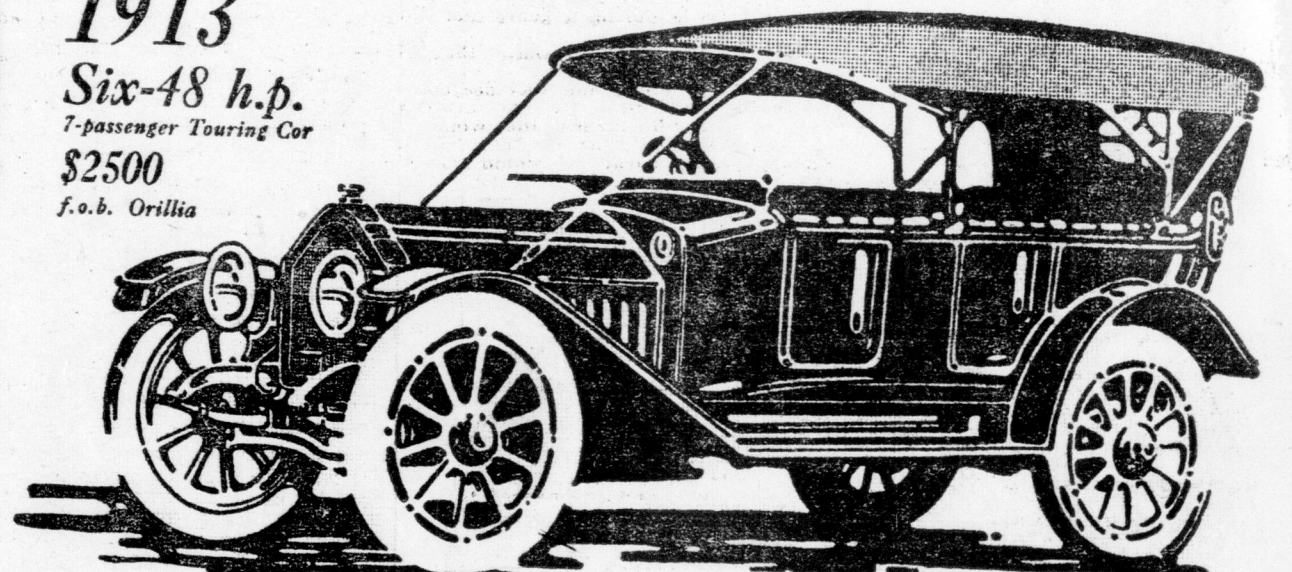
