## THE UNITED EMPIRE.

It is quite possible the German Emperor was influenced in his aggressive movements by the domestic condition of Great Britain. The Irish question must have seemed to him a golden opportunity. Britain, to an outsider, must have seemed on the verge of a civil war. With the north and south of Ireland both arming, to fight each other, with part of the island breathing out warlike threats against the Government, with political feeling in England more bitter than it has been for generations, with the suffragettes and their male sympathizers daily committing breaches of the peace, and with a more or less antagonism between labor and capital, the empire would certainly seem to be in a very unfit state to enter a war. And if Britain was forced by internal troubles to keep the peace, the Kaiser might well believe he would be in a better position to grasp despotic power, and assume the domination of Europe.

But if he had any such dreams, he has by this time been rudely awakened. At the first threat of war, domestic turmoil suddenly ceased. The Irish volunteers, enlisted with the ostensible purpose of fighting each other, offer to fight side by side against the common enemy. Tory and Liberal join hands; Englishman, Scotchman, Irishman, Welshman stand shoulder to shoulder. There will still be a few men—good men and worthy citizens—who are slow to move, or who realize the horrors of war so intensely that they are not prepared to accept the decision of the Government, and will criticize and oppose it. That is unavoidable in a nation of free men who prize, above all things, full liberty of thought and speech. But the overwhelming mass of the British people forget their party differences, drop their domestic quarrels and are one people, in the face of a common foe.

The same condition, we believe, will be found in all the overseas dominions. In those sections of the empire, the military spirit is of necessity less active under ordinary circumstances than in the British Isles. We see less of the paraphernalia of war, and have less of the warlike element. But when the Empire is in danger, there is the universal demand throughout South Africa, throughout the Australasian Islands, throughout South Africa, to spring to the defence of the motherland. In the Dominions there are many diverse races, but there will be no divergence of opinion or of action. In Canada there are many thousands of French descent; they and their fathers have shown their loyalty to Britain in the past by the sacrifice of life and property, as they will today, if required, and their hearty co-operation with their Anglo-Saxon compatriots will only be intensified by the fact that France and Britain are allies in this war. Our citizens of Germanic races might be excused if their love for their fatherland weakened their enthusiasm for Britain in this contest. But while this might affect some of the older generation born in Europe, the young German-Canadian is Canadian to the core. And if Sir Adam Beck may be taken as a type of this class his prompt offer to the Government shows that Canadians, no matter where their fathers were born, are Canadians to the core and as loyal to the Empire as any men can be.

So it will doubtless be in South Africa, where Boer and Britain will enlist in the same army. In the vast islands of the Southern Pacific, there is less diversity of race, and the mass of the people are of British descent. No shadow of doubt will be cast on their loyalty; none will question their active devotion to the Empire. So it will be in all the four quarters of the globe, wherever flies the Union Jack. A few advocates of peace at any price will be found; a few politicians and yellow journalists will see in the crisis a chance for personal profit or party advantage. But as in the motherland, so throughout the Empire, internal dissensions will cease, and there will be one flag, one country, one purpose.

## VICTORY'S FRUITS.

BOTH sides in the great war have doubtless ideas more or less definite of what they will do with victory. The two Teuton brigands must have had some rosy plans in mind. Servia, France has, needless to say, a red eye fixed on Alsace and Lorraine, with a slice more for long-deferred interest. If Germany's force and efficiency should be too much for her enemies, we might look for the Teutonic absorption of the Balkans, Holland, Belgium and French Lorraine, a protectorate over Switzerland, Turkey and Greece, a renewal of the old Teutonic menace south of the Alps, and a bullying supervision of Europe in general. Enormous war indemnities would be exacted from the triple entente, and if Britain's fleet by any chance failed, her overseas possessions would tend to slide into the German maw.

Such a consummation would naturally be opposed by the neutral powers, as Italy, Japan, and, perhaps, even the United States. None of these powers could endure a world hegemony of either Teuton or Russ. Would the United States abandon its traditional isolation from European affairs to tamper the wind to the shorn antagonist?

If the triple entente wins a complete victory, as seems probable enough, Russia might demand from Germany Posen, and from Austria Galicia, thus completing her Polish territory. Bosnia and Croatia might be taken from Austria and given to Servia, which would thus become the dominant state of the Balkan peninsula. If Roumania wants to wrench Transylvania and Bukovina from the Roumanian population from Austria, her cue is to line up with the Triple Entente. She will get nothing by helping Germany at any rate.

France will perhaps take Luxembourg as well as the lost provinces, but it would be a doubtful gain. Great Britain never has been grasping in the hour of victory. She has been more remarkable for her restorations than for her acquisitions, except in the one instance of Canada. Although she mainly overthrew Napoleon, she got practically nothing for her labors but debt, and the privilege of towing the Corsican to St. Helena. This time she should, if possible, make Germany and Austria pay for the war through the nose, and also not forget to put the Kaiser and his advisers on St. Helena for life. The Kaiser, who is a play-

wright of reputation, might write a fine tragedy of the war to while away the time, and make his counsellors act the parts in it with him.

**WAR IN THE CLOUDS.**  
FROM the scene of the war are already coming stories of daring feats by the army aviators. One story is that a French aeroplane rammed and wrecked one of the Kaiser's dirigibles. Even, if this is a false report, there is no question but that such encounters will take place, if the war is lengthy. The airman who for fun, fame or money loops the loop, and performs kindred stunts, will not hesitate to take a chance when it is for the honor of his country. The French today lead the rest of the world in aeronautics, and their navy of the air is far ahead of those of the other powers. Germany pins her faith largely on dirigibles, of which she possesses 40, her aeroplanes numbering 375. France has gone in heavily for aeroplanes, having no less than 550. Her dirigibles number 20.

The present war will, doubtless, demonstrate whether the dirigible is more dependable than the aeroplane as an instrument of war. The Zeppelin machines, despite occasional collapses, can be considered successful. They have shown remarkable stability and possess the advantage of being able to carry a large crew. On the other hand, the aeroplane holds a distinct advantage in its great speed and the ease and rapidity with which it can be handled. Another notable disadvantage of the dirigible is its immense size, which makes it discernible at great distance, and an easy mark for the sharpshooters. That part of the war, which will be fought in the air, is likely to prove as interesting and thrilling as the combats under and on the water, and on the land.

## THE MORATORIUM.

MORATORIUM, an unfamiliar word, means the legal right to suspend debt payment for an indefinite period. Anxious to keep the financial and commercial world as steady as possible, several powers have declared a moratorium. No bills of exchange are payable, the object being to give relief to everyone. [St. Thomas Journal.] There have been two noteworthy advances in Canada under the Borden Government. The tariff has been increased and so has the cost of living.

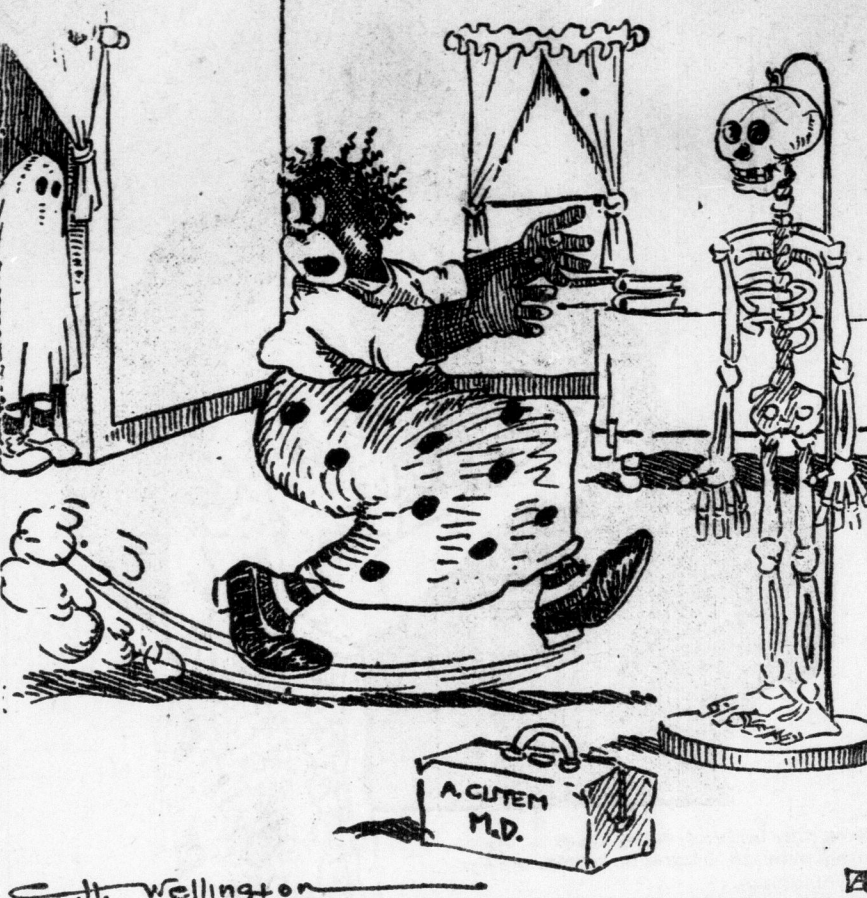
**THE MODERN WAR.**
