From Foot of Dundas Street to Springbank River Is in Indescribably Filthy Condition - Odors Arising Are Sickening.

IS SMELLING TO HEAVEN

Londoners Cannot Ask Friends to Take Boat Ride Down Thames as Effluvia Simply Nauseates - Provincial Health Board To Be Notified.

"If the Allies want to get enough deadly gas to put the whole German army to sleep for a million years, all they have to do is to get their gasbottling apparatus busy in the Thames River from the foot of Dundas street to Springbank. Not for many years has the river been in such an indescribably filthy condi-tion as it is right now. The odors rising from it at many points are

simply sickening."
A citizen who has kept a fine launch on the river for many years spoke as above to The Advertiser today, after a trip down the river. Other boat owners have complained also, and now they are planning to bring the matter to the attention of the provincial board of health, and it is likely that the city of Chatham wil be asked to co-operate also in an effort to take whatever steps may be deemed advisable in stopping

pollution of the river.

At the boat docks at the foot of Dundas street, at the Forks, and at many points down the river, there are huge patches of putrid matter, composed of sewage and filth from a tannery. The spectacle is disa tannery. The spectacle is dis-gusting, and the odors sickening. BEAUTY SPOT A CESSPOOL.

"It is bad enough for us when we want to take a little trip down the river," said one launch owner, "but It is a hundred times worse if we ask any visitors to come down with us. It is a shame that such a beauty spot as the river should turned into a cesspool."

The boat-owners complain bitterly of the filth which pours into the Thames from the tannery. At the orth end a steady stream of reddish iquid, and other matter from the tannery, some of it unpleasantly doriferous, pours into the river. The Advertiser was shown couple of acres of ground adjoining the septic tanks, over which spread to the depth of about two feet tons of hair, which is constantly being taken from the tanks. So much matter of this kind com down, it is claimed, that the efficiency of the system is being seriinterfered with. Some of the tanks are practically choked with hair, and when the septic tanks are not working right and block up the sewage passes through an overflow into the river, and produces condi-

ducive to good health. TANKS NEED CLEANING. It was stated to The Advertiser that an appropriation was recently made by the council for the purpose of cleaning out the septic tanks. So reat was the volume of hair found in them that it is claimed the money was expended before the work

CAN'T ENJOY RIVER NOW. At the present time there is a fleet of 45 boats of all sizes read for launching on the Thames. These boats represent an outlay to the owners of over \$25,000, and they pleasure from boating on the river if the stream were not in such a filthy condition. The existing condition, they claim, is absolutely contrary to the rules of the provincial board of health, and can easily be remedied,

The docks the boat club have con-structed at the foot of Dundas street are surrounded by filth, much of which, it is said, has come from the tannery. A couple of hundred feet to the south, just where the south branch flows into the north, there is a very large patch of putrid matter. Cannot Tap Them. "Because of the location of these sewers and the general topographical conditions of the land they drain, it is manifestly impossible for us to ever exsystem and turn their flow into the interceptory trunks that run to the cove sewer farm, where the sewage is treated by septic tanks and beds. "Pumping stations to 'lift' the sew-age from the low-lying sewers into the main level would be too costly to be considered, I believe, neither would a whole series of septic tanks at the fitting guaranteed.
