DERNBURG PATTING HIMSELF ON BACK

Tells Interviewer His Mission in United States Was Successful.

WOULD FIGHT AT FRONT

Says He Wishes to Accompany His 17-Year-Old Son.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, June 24.—An interview with Dr. DERNBURG, the former German colonial secretary, published by the Tribune today, was obtained here, that paper says, on June 11, under the stipulation that it should not be printed until Dr. DERNBURG's arrival in Bergen, Norway.

"Some of the Allies might take offence at some of my statements and interfere with my journey," he was quoted as saying. The steamer Bergenfjord, on which Dr. DERNBURG was a passenger, was due to arrive in Bergen today, but a delayed dispatch from London, received here last night, says that the vessel had been detained at Kirkwall, Scotland, where it was understood the passengers and crew were undergoing an investigation.

His Mission.

The Tribune quotes Dr. DERNBURG as saying that his mission in the United States, though curtailed, had been successful. "I feel that the great American public has been given a clearer and better understanding of the German cause and the German aims of this war," he added. "Germany at the beginning of the war was so isolated that the underlying motives for and the German viewpoint of the war might never have penetrated through the veil of isolation which our enemies have tried to surround us. If I have succeeded in presenting to the intelligent body of Americans the basic facts of this war as Germany sees them, and upon which her gigantic struggle is based, the main object of my mission will have been accomplished."

Future Undecided.

"My plans for the future are undecided. I desire nothing better than to go to the front by the side of my oldest son, a lad of 17 years, who is going to join the colors as soon as I get back."

Dr. DERNBURG says that he would go immediately to Berlin and confer with Government officials there. He positively denied that he would carry on any propaganda work from any of the Scandinavian countries.

ITALIAN SUCCESS FOR FIRST MONTH

General Shows Territory Captured From Austrian Enemies.

Rome, via Chiasso to Paris, June 24.—One of the chief generals in the Italian war office summarizes the first month of the Italian campaign against Austria as follows:

"One month ago the Italians invaded Austrian territory, uprooted the yellow and black poles bearing the Austrian eagle and occupied the enemy positions along a front of 500 miles. An Austrian squadron bombarded the Italian coast on the Adriatic and Austrian aeroplanes dropped eleven bombs on Venice."

"During this month the Italians overran the whole of Friuli. The capture of Tolmino and Gorizia, the two Austrian strongholds, is considered imminent, which would open the way to Trieste, while in the Alpine region in the Province of Trent they have conquered peaks and passes, from which the picked Austro-Hungarian troops have been unable to dislodge them."

"Austrian activity has been chiefly displayed in bombarding the Italian Adriatic towns."

ELECTING OFFICERS.

Chicago, Ill., June 24.—Election of officers absorbed interest in the convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, which held its final sessions today.

Herbert S. Houston of New York City, it was expected, would be elected president of the association, to succeed William Wardhead of San Francisco.

Numerous papers were read at the final general sessions today, among them one on educational work, by Llewellyn R. Pratt of New York City, chairman of the education committee.

CANADIAN CATTLE FOR FRANCE.

PARIS, June 23.—4:55 p.m.—The committee on agriculture of the Chamber of Deputies has decided to send a sub-committee of St. Nazaire to examine the condition of Canadian cattle on the hoof, the first shipment of which is due to arrive June 25.

CANADIAN STEEL IS NOT COMPLETE

Manufacturers Have to Go to States for Parts, Says Curzon.

DELIVERY IS BAD, TOO

Peer Denies, However, That Canadian Firms Were Snubbed.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

LONDON, June 23.—Lord Curzon in the Lords tonight gave indignant denial to the assertion that Canadian munition makers had been snubbed. Offers received from time to time from Canadian firms have been referred to the Dominion Government.

Direct negotiations have not taken place with firms, as it was arranged that such negotiations should proceed through the Canadian Government. The contract with J. P. Morgan & Co. was entered into because direct dealing with firms in the States proved unsatisfactory. Morgan had not a complete monopoly, even in the States.

Lord Curzon added that the Government desired to obtain all possible material from the Dominions. Canadian makers, though not snubbed, were not complete, but had to go to the United States for competent parts. Delivery from Canada, he said, has been exceptionally bad.

WATFORD OFFICER LEFT WOUNDED IN TRENCH

Lieut. Thomas L. Swift—Other Western Ontario Officers' Whereabouts.

LONDON, Eng., June 23.—Latest information contains the following particulars concerning Lieut. Thomas L. Swift, Watford, who was previously reported wounded.

Capt. G. T. Delamare of Stratford has a sprained leg and is in a London hospital.

Lieut. Stapleton, Watford, of the 1st Battalion, is at Rouen with shrapnel wounds in both legs.

Capt. George Wilkinson of Windsor, 1st Battalion, is doing well in a hospital.

Lieut. Thomas L. Swift, Watford, is reported to have been left wounded in the second line of German trenches. He was previously reported wounded.

Lieut. Nelson Chesham, Stratford, 1st Battalion, is in Rouen and his condition is satisfactory.

Major Baron Osborne of Berlin, Ont., 3rd Battalion, is wounded in the leg and doing well.

GERMAN SUBMARINES ENTER MEDITERRANEAN

TOKIO, June 23.—10:30 a.m.—Official reports having been received from Rome that seven German submarines have successfully entered the Mediterranean through the strait of Gibraltar, has caused Japanese companies to issue warnings to all merchant vessels in the Mediterranean, and also to extend war insurance on vessels from Marseilles to Port Said.

WAR PICTURES BANNED ON "MOVIE" SCREENS

Provincial Board of Censors Reaches Decision After Consultation With Military.

TORONTO, June 23.—No war pictures, real or faked, can be presented by the "movies" in Ontario. This is the decision reached by the provincial board of censors, who have been in communication with the militia department.

Pictures of troops marching will be permitted, but no actual war, according to Reuter's Petrograd correspondent.

British Cruiser Is Torpedoed in North Sea

Roxburgh Damaged But Is Able to Proceed.

LONDON, June 23.—11:43 p.m.—An official communication issued by the admiralty tonight says: "The British cruiser Roxburgh was struck by a torpedo in the North Sea Sunday last. The damage sustained was not serious, and the cruiser was able to proceed under her own steam. There were no casualties."

The Roxburgh is a vessel of 10,850 tons, and is 450 feet long. Her complement in peace times was 600 men. The cruiser was built in 1904, and has a speed of about 21 knots.

RUSSIANS ADMIT LEAVING LEMBERG

Reports Defeats of Enemy at North and South Ends of Line.

PETROGRAD, June 23 (via London).—The following official communication in which the details of the evacuation of Lemberg are given, has been made public by the war office:

"In the Shavli region there is no change. The fighting continues."

"South of the Ralgor Lakes our troops on the night of the 22nd, crossing the River Egrin, occupied the village of Kocivil, annihilating an entire German company."

"In the direction of Lomza there has been violent artillery fire."

"On the Tanew, near the village of Lubliniec, we repulsed enemy attacks. To the west of Rawa Ruska the enemy was driven back from some villages and near the village of Ostaszewo our cavalry captured three enemy companies."

Stubborn Fighting.

"On the 21st and during the following night in the direction of Lemberg we arrested an enemy offensive by stubborn fighting. The enemy suffered great losses in the course of barren attacks near the village of Broghovice and farther south on the River Sacczer, but succeeded in advancing in the region of the town of Jolkiet."

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
