FLAMES DESTROY WINNIPEG BLOCK

WINNIPEG, Sept. 11.—Several places of business suffered heavy losses in an early morning fire which completely gutted the Kennedy block, on Portage avenue, east of Hargrave street, and affected the Edward and Dismorr buildings.

The Crystal Palace confectionery and the Tate shoe store, occupying the ground floor of the Kennedy block, suffered the heaviest loss, estimated at \$200,000.

WOULD PURIFY MOVIE FILMS

Association of Canadian Clubs Recommends Early Action.

Formation of Young Men's and Women's Clubs Is Advocated.

HAMILTON, Sept. 11.—Purification of moving-picture films, general acceptance of a standardized version of "O Canada," the formation of young men's and young women's Canadian clubs wherever possible, and indorsement of the Western Canada Colonization Association's project of immigration, were recommended this afternoon at the tenth annual conference of the Association of Canadian Clubs.

Marshaling her facts in an impressive manner, Mrs. R. F. McWilliams of the Women's Canadian Club of Winnipeg reviewed the effective progress made by the good films committee in Manitoba in banishing from moving picture theatres all that is salacious, neurotic, too suggestive of sex, and those features subversive of the laws of chastity and marriage. Holding that the youth of Canada needed the leadership of its elders in Canadian ideals and sentiment, and that the spirit of Canadian clubs had touched only young Canadian men and women to a small degree, Major P. N. Alexander, and Capt. G. E. Raleigh of the Young Men's Club of Toronto, submitted a motion that the desired national spirit be promoted by the institution of a movement having for its aim the establishment of young men's and young women's branches wherever these are deemed advisable.

The motion was adopted. Kirwan Martin, K. C., of Hamilton, expressed a hope that definite steps would be taken to act upon the motion.

A spirited appeal for the Women's Canadian Clubs to support the aims of the League of Nations was made by Mrs. Mary Dunn, Hamilton.

Voting on the question of where next year's convention shall be held, a majority favored Victoria, B. C. Invitations were also received from Port Arthur, Fort William, Quebec City, St. John, N. B., and Calgary.

Mayor Copley said there should be restrictive legislation that would remove from the hands of powerful speculators the vast acreage of Western Canada, so that this would be available to the new settlers.

Col. F. P. Healey, secretary of the Hamilton Chamber of Commerce, emphasized the need of a rigid system of inspection at the point of embarkation instead of the point of disembarkation.

The discussion on the diversified versions of "O Canada" now extant was lengthy. On motion of Mrs. Clarry and Mrs. Harry Carpenter, Hamilton, the association recommended that Dr. Richardson's translation of the Routhier composition be accepted in Canada, save where it is sung in the French tongue.

CUT DOWN OCEAN FREIGHT ON EGGS

Request Made Following 100 Per Cent Drop in British Prices.

OTTAWA, Sept. 11.—A reduction in ocean freight on eggs from 35 cents to 25 cents a cubic foot is announced by the steamship companies at Montreal, as a result of direct representations made by egg exporters of the Dominion department of agriculture to the various steamship companies operating between Canada and Great Britain.

In requesting the 25-cent rate attention was called to the heavy stock of storage eggs in Canada bought and stored at prices equal to those of 1921, and to the 100 per cent drop in prices on the British market, the two factors making export practically impossible without serious loss.

This is the second reduction in the course of a few weeks, the previous rate of 40 cents having been reduced at the request of the transportation committee of the Canadian Produce Association. The charge amounts now to 62½ per 30 dozen cases, or a little more than 2 cents a dozen. At the present rate of 40 cents the cost was 3 1-3 cents a dozen.

STATE CORN CROP IN GOOD CONDITION

TORONTO, Sept. 11.—The weekly crop report issued by the Ontario department of agriculture states that while the corn crop is coming along nicely the oats yield will not be as heavy as previously estimated.

A few complaints of potato rot are coming into the department, but on the whole the potato crop is regarded as being in fair condition.

As low as 50c per bag has been reported in Simcoe County. Considerable fall wheat has been sown, but many farmers are holding back for a week or two in order to avoid the Hessian fly.

The apple crop in North Simcoe County is a heavy one so far as the earlier varieties are concerned, but it is difficult to secure a market. Weather is about ready to pick, but it is feared by many that no market will be forthcoming.

ST. MARYS GIRL AWARDED 4TH BLAKE SCHOLARSHIP

TORONTO, Sept. 11.—The third award of bursaries in Canadian universities to the sons and daughters of deceased and totally disabled soldiers has just been announced by Miss Constance B. Lang, national educational secretary of the Imperial Order of Daughters of the Empire. The bursaries form a part of the national war memorial scheme instituted by the order in 1919. JACKSON, California, Sept. 11.—Wives and female relatives of 47 miners entombed in the Argonaut mine, California, gather before the shaft to learn latest news of their loved ones, probably doomed to death by suffocation.

FIRE DESTROYS 2 KENT BARNS

Blaze Caused by Lightning Results in Damage Estimated At \$20,000.

21 Motor Accidents Occur in Storm Which Sweeps County.

Special to London Advertiser. CHATHAM, Sept. 11.—Two barns on the farm of Thomas Holdway, concession 14, Harwich Township, were totally destroyed by fire resulting from lightning during a severe storm which hit the city and county last night. Livestock, grain and a complete threshing outfit were consumed in the flames and the damage has been estimated at approximately \$20,000.

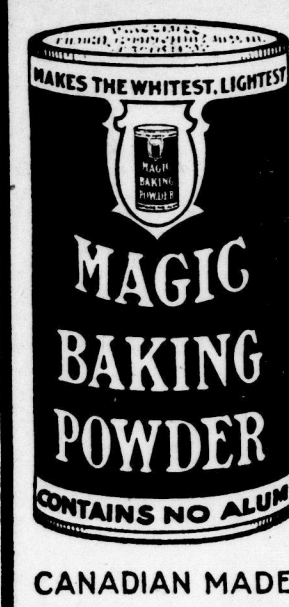
Rain fell heavily in South Kent. One house on the Ridge road was struck by lightning and shingles were ripped off. Lightning also struck a fence in Dover Township, destroying several fence posts.

Local telephone service was temporarily disabled and a telephone pole struck by lightning burned out a heavy cable supplying a portion of the city business section. Doctors' offices are the only ones supplied today until the repairs have been effected and a new cable installed. As a result of the storm there were many motor car accidents, six occurring in the city during the storm and 15 occurring on Kent County roads.
