DECLARES RUSSIA MAY GO TO WAR WITH GT. BRITAIN

Soviet Official States Curzon's Ultimatum Cannot Be Accepted.

SPEED UP WORK

Lausanne Conference Delegates Warned That Something Must Be Done.

Associated Press Despatch. Moscow, May 12.—The Soviet gov ernment does not desire a break with Great Britain and is willing to confer with that country; but it cannot accept such an ultimatum as that contained in Lord Curzon's recent note, said M. Ganetsky, deputy minister of foreign affairs, in speech de-

livered at a meeting here yesterday. The meeting passed a resolution protesting against the British note and declaring that Russia is ready, if necessary to meet with armed force any nation which endeavors to infringe upon its independence.


