BEATTY WOULD AID COLONIZATION BY ADVERTISING

President of C. P. R. Speaks Before Border Cities Chamber of Commerce.

SUGGESTS BOND ISSUE

Windsor, April 16.—The Border Cities Chamber of Commerce, 500 strong, turned out tonight to greet E. W. Beatty, president of the C. P. R., who addressed them on national topics. Mr. Beatty arrived this afternoon from Toronto and was met at the station by a number of prominent citizens headed by A. R. Bartlett.

Mr. Beatty was accompanied by J. J. Scully, general manager C. P. R. Eastern Lines, Montreal; H. C. Groat, general superintendent; W. Fulton, and M. Brown of Toronto. Mr. Beatty was introduced to the gathering by A. R. Bartlett, who paid tribute to the guest of the evening, and to the organization he represented.

In touching on immigration matters Mr. Beatty laid down a definite program which he suggested should be entered upon by the government in encouraging the bringing of desirable new citizens and capital to Canada. This included the suggested floating of a \$10,000,000 bond issue to be used in assisting new comers by means of loans to establish themselves upon the land.

"The Dominion government should forthwith issue an invitation through the medium of advertisements, literature, lectures, moving pictures and exhibitions to the people of Great Britain, United States and selected countries of northern and central Europe to come to Canada as colonists and assist in the development of our unoccupied lands. It is understood that the government will take all steps necessary to aid those people now resident in Canada to take up improved or unimproved lands for the purpose of engaging in farming and will render all necessary assistance to enable such people to carry on their farming operations successfully.

HURLED TO DEATH FROM AUTOMOBILE

Toronto Girl Is Killed After Falling From Speeding Machine.

Toronto, April 16.—Miss Jean Ferguson, aged about 22, was almost instantly killed late tonight, when she either jumped or was thrown out of a speeding motor car. There is no clue to the identity of other occupants of the car in which Miss Ferguson was a passenger.

Miss Doris Slade was an eye-witness of the tragedy. She told the detective she was walking along the street when the motor car, travelling at a high rate of speed, shot past her, and Miss Ferguson was hurled into the roadway. The young lady alighted upon her head on the sidewalk, right at Miss Slade's feet. Horrified at the sight of the prone, bleeding form, Miss Slade, almost at the point of collapse, was able to call for assistance.

Miss Ferguson was carried to a doctor's office nearby, but was found to be dead when examined. She came from Scotland about a year ago.

WESTERN PROVINCES IN GRIP OF BLIZZARD

Brandon Reports 15-Inch Snow Fall in Past 48 Hours.

Winnipeg, April 16.—Western Ontario, Manitoba and many districts in southwestern Saskatchewan were in the grip of one of the worst blizzards experienced in recent years.

Brandon reports a 15-inch fall of snow during the past 48 hours, while between Winnipeg and the head of the lakes heavy snow was general last night and today. Winnipeg experienced all kinds of weather during the night, heavy rain, thunder and lightning and sleet, which later turned to snow, which is still falling.

As a result of the storm, Winnipeg was isolated from Eastern Canada and the south during the morning, all telegraph wires going down under the weight of sleet and wet snow.

At noon weather indicated a storm east of Winnipeg was abating, with the temperature generally above the freezing point.

ELECT SWARAJISTS' HEAD AS MAYOR OF CALCUTTA

HARRINGTON MAN FATALLY INJURED

Dies in Few Moments After Arm Is Severed and Leg Badly Cut.

Embryo, April 16.—Robert Darling of Harrington died within a few moments after his right arm had been severed near the shoulder, and his left leg nearly severed when he fell, in some unknown manner, on a big circular saw in the mill of E. A. Clarke at Harrington, late this afternoon.

Dr. Montgomery of Embro and Dr. Allison of Lakeside were called to the scene of the accident, but the injured man was dead before they arrived. They reported the incident to Coroner Dr. Green, but no announcement has as yet been made regarding an inquest.

The late Mr. Darling was at one time a teacher, and later for a number of years conducted a store in Harrington, but for the past few years he has been living a more retired life and has at various times assisted with work about the village. He was about 50 years of age, and is survived by his widow and three young daughters. It is understood that the funeral will be held on Saturday.
