**NO BLAME IS LAID IN WOMAN'S DEATH**  
Verdict Given in Case of Mrs. B. Jordan, Killed Between Freight Cars.  
HUSBAND ESCAPED

Chatham, Oct. 30.—A verdict of accidental death in the case of Bertha Jordan, 45, fatally injured when crushed between freight cars last Saturday was returned tonight by a coroner's jury.

Mrs. Jordan was crawling between two of a string of stationary freight cars in the Dominion Sugar Co. yards and was fatally hurt when the yard engine backed other cars into them, the woman being shoved by the wheels for a distance of eight feet.

Her husband, William Jordan, was the only eye-witness, he having climbed first over the couplings of the two cars.

The jury found that the accident was due to the negligence of the yard engine driver, who was not looking out for the woman.

**MARITIME RIGHTS CRY TURNED NOVA SCOTIA**  
Success of Conservatives Due To Restless Feeling in Maritime Provinces.

Halifax, N.S., Oct. 30.—The wholesale defeat of the Liberal party in Nova Scotia—with the exception of Hon. E. M. MacDonald, Guysborough—Antigonish, William Duff in Queen's, Lunenburg, and Paul Hatfield in Shelburne-Yarmouth, came with almost as great a shock to the inner Liberal circles in Nova Scotia as did the provincial election, when, with a landslide that carried all constituencies with the exception of three, Nova Scotia threw out its 43-year-old Liberal government.

The defeat of such old-time campaigners as Hon. J. Logan and the Hon. R. E. Finn, men with reputations in the province as well as Ottawa, by comparative newcomers in the political field went to show that the people of Nova Scotia are restless.

Despite the strong campaign put up on the strength of low tariff being the salvation of Nova Scotia, and the folly of introducing high tariff against the United States—the annual market of the maritimes—the cry of maritime rights as introduced by the Conservative somewhat late in the campaign, was undoubtedly a great rallying cry for the voters.

**BEATS SEVEN BANDITS ALONE IN GUN BATTLE**  
Gunner Captured After One Is Killed by Wounded Officer.

Union City, N.J., Oct. 30.—Single-handed, Lieut. Emil Fuhrman of the Hudson boulevard police today fought seven gunmen, killing one and enabling officers to arrest the others.

Fuhrman saw a sole patrolman exchanging shots with the occupants of a speeding motor car. He jumped on his motorcycle and gave chase.

After a few blocks the car turned turtle and as Fuhrman came up guns were drawn and a number of shots exchanged.

Fuhrman killed one man before he dropped with a serious wound in the chest. By this time other patrolmen had arrived and arrested the gang.

Investigation revealed that the gunmen were fleeing from the scene of an attempted hold-up. Two of the occupants of their car were kidnapped drivers of the motor truck which they had attempted to rob.

**OVERHEATED GAS STOVE CAUSES \$500 DAMAGE**  
Fire originating from an overheated gas stove, caused damage estimated at \$500 to the stock of J. W. Lesner, general merchant, at the corner of Hill and Wellington streets.

The fire was first noticed by Constable Stewart who, while passing the building on his beat, saw smoke pouring from the basement window. A general alarm was sounded, and the firemen quickly extinguished the flames. The fire started in the basement of the store, and much of the stock was damaged by fire and smoke.

The building is owned by Henry Winder, who lives above the store.

**BANDITS GET \$10,000.**
