



The death penalty may be inflicted for murder, man-slaughter, attempted murder, robbery, counterfeit-ing; looting and burglary. It may also be inflicted upon those known to have been Boxers, who have done injury to life or property. Other punishments, like whipping, imprisonments and the imposition of fines can be inflicted. Owing to orders being received from Berlin, a hitch has occurred regarding the transfer of the railway which Rus-sia yesterday began turning over to Ger-many. French railway engineers have made a breach in the Western wall of the Chinese city, through which they will bring the Pao Ting Fu railway. The Tien-Tsin line will be extended to the wall of the Tartar city. Berlin, Jan. 15.—The German foreign office has received official despatches con-firming the press report that the Chinese plenipotentiaries have signed the agree-ment, but has received nothing to indi-cate whether the note has been returns ed to the foreign envoys.

WHOLESALE ARRESTS.

United States Authorities Seize Mou Than a Thousand Men on Suspicion.

Manila, Jan. 15.—Thirty insurgents who have been sentenced to be deported to the island of Guam were taken on board the United States transport Rose-crans to-day, and she will sail to mor-row. The sentence of deportation has been suspended in the cases of two priests of the party, who are charged with collecting money for the insurgents, but they will be kept in confinement. Nearly 1,300 men were arrested in vari-ous towns south of Manila on Sunday, on suspicion of being guerillas. Most of them were released.

ROSSLAND ORE OUTPUT.

Rossland, Jan. 12.—The great news of the week is that the Le Roi Mining Co. have determined to sink beyond the 900-foot level 600 feet. The contract for this is about to be let and the contractors will begin upon the work at an early date—probably this week. The continu-ation of the shaft is for the whole of the five compartments, and will include the timbering down to the 1,500-foot level. This will form the staple of the developation of the shart shart and will include the timbering down to the 1,500-foot level. This will form the staple of the develop-ment work for the year, and it is expect-ed that the sinking to this depth will about occupy the whole of the remainder of the year. In the meantime the de-velopment above will far more than suf-fice to keep the mine going, even at the contemplated increased output, for that period of time. With the preparedness of the machinery and the extension of the Northport smelter, the mine will now be in a position to do some good work. From a financial point of view, with the improvements paid for and the smelter interests wholly its own, it may be ex-pected that for the coming year the divi-dends will be much larger than have heretofore been declared. The shipments for the week have not much exceeded the 6,000-ton mark, whereas it is expected that before many weeks the 7,000-ton mark will have been left behind.
