C. P. R. STOCK ADVANCES IN NEW YORK AND LONDON

Has Gained Over Fourteen Points Over Quotations of a Week Ago. FAITH IN FUTURE OF COMPANY. General Prosperity of the Dominion and Western Extensions Are Given as the Cause.

C. P. R. stock has advanced to 200 1/2 in New York and 201 3/4 in London. The purpose of a despatch received by the Colonist yesterday after this announcement created some speculation as to the reason for such a marked advance and caused much general discussion in local business circles.

Mr. Galletly believed that the assertion that the general prosperity of Canada was having a marked effect upon the strength of the C. P. R. stock was well founded. But he was also of the opinion that the recent extension of the system in the west, and the enterprise that was being displayed by the directors of the company in preparing to obtain a big share of the continually growing trade of the west, as well as the movement on Vancouver Island, had given the stock a new impetus.
