JUDGMENT IN BLACK FOX CASE

When a Fox Is Not a Fox—Judgment Given in Peculiar Bonaventure Case

Judgment was rendered recently in the Superior Court at New Carlisle in the case of Barriault vs. Bujold. Barriault, a settler of St. Alphonse, had started in a few years ago setting traps to catch foxes. Shortly after he had commenced to set his traps, his uncle, Joseph Bujold, of Maria, happened to be in St. Alphonse, and showed how to set his traps, he Bujold, being a hunter of about forty years' experience.

After Barriault had been taught the secret, he promised that he would give his uncle the first fox that he would catch to recompense him for having showed him how to set traps. The next morning after he had been shown, Barriault went to his trap, and found a black fox in it. Bujold took the black fox home claiming it was his because it was the first fox taken. Barriault claimed that the fox was delivered to Bujold simply in order that he, Bujold, would sell it and give the money to him.

Bujold sold the fox and sent a certain amount to Barriault, but Barriault was not satisfied with the amount received, and sued Bujold for the balance. Bujold retained the firm of Bugeaud & Cote, lawyers of New Carlisle who claimed that their client was entitled to the fox, because Barriault had told him that he would give him the first fox that he would catch. This was the first fox caught, therefore, it belonged to Bujold.

The attorney pleaded that the fox had been delivered to Bujold as his property. Barriault retained the Honorable John Hall Kelly, K. C., and the latter pleaded that it was true that his client had said that he would give the first fox that he would catch to his uncle, but that when he said this he only had in mind the ordinary red fox, that he had never thought that the first fox would be a black fox, and consequently although the first fox caught was a black fox, that he was not obliged to deliver it.

He also claimed that the fox was delivered to Bujold to sell for his client. By the judgment that has been handed down, the Superior Court at New Carlisle, presided by Justice Tessier, has decided that Barriault was not obliged to deliver the black fox, although it was the first fox taken. The judgment also declares that the black fox belonged to Barriault and the Bujold who had sold the fox was obliged to hand over the amount received for the fox to Barriault, less a certain amount which the Court allowed Bujold for his trouble, etc., in bringing about the sale of the fox, after it had been delivered to him.

Bujold has authorized his Attorneys Messrs. Bugeaud & Cote, to take the case to appeal, so again the question will be thrashed out in a higher Court to know who owns the fox. The case so far has been followed with considerable interest. The spectators while the case was being pleaded rendered judgment some far, some against each party, the main argument being "the first fox is the first fox," but then there is the beautiful uncertainty of the law.
