**TOWN OFFICERS
WERE APPOINTED**Regular Session of Town
Council Held Friday
Evening.**INTERVIEWED MR. BRADY.**

The regular meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council chamber Friday evening. The Worshipful Mayor Murray and Councillors McDonald, Miller, Andrew, McLean, Mowat and McLennan being present.

The regular order of business was suspended and the appointment of Town Officers was proceeded with.

The regular order of business was resumed and a communication was read from Malcolm Pratt in reference to the town's charge for putting in sewerage service at his house. Referred to Water and Sewerage Committee.

A number of petitions for licenses to conduct a bowling alley, pool rooms, etc. were read and referred to the Police and License Committee.

The various department accounts were passed on recommendation of the chairman.

The Police and License Committee reported on the petitions of Messrs. Ed. Alexander, P. E. Chaytor, Sam Frenette, Jos. Dambolke and N. W. Levesque for license to conduct livery stables and recommended that the licenses be granted.

Coun. McDonald brought up the matter of seeking of prisoners on the streets or public works. He suggested that the Town Solicitor be asked to look into the matter and report at the next meeting. Should get these prisoners to work at an early date. Coun. McDonald read the Act as published in the Graphic.

On motion the Police and License Committee be authorized to confer and act with the Town Solicitor to prepare rules and regulations in reference to the employment of persons on Public Works and report at next meeting. Carried.

Coun. Mowat referred to the running of No. 42 train from West. It was due here at 6 o'clock, but it was invariably five o'clock before it arrived here. Something should be done at once.

Coun. McLennan moved that a committee composed of the Mayor and Couns. McDonald and Mowat interview Mr. Brady of the Committee who was in town Friday night. Carried. Council adjourned.

MANAGER BRADY**Talked Over Railway Mat-
ters of Interest to
Campbellton.**CHANGES PROMISED.**

The committee of the Town Council composed of His Worshipful Mayor Murray and Couns. Mowat and McDonald waited on Mr. Brady, one of the Board of Management of the I. C. R. in his private car here Friday night and although the hour was late were very pleasantly received.

Mr. Brady impressed the committee first, as being a practical railway man with thorough knowledge of the business and also as a man who was not afraid to express his opinions.

The principle matter under discussion was No. 42 train, which is scheduled to arrive here from the west at 6 o'clock. This train is invariably late and the committee pressed to have this remedied.

Mr. Brady explained that this train is not a freight train and secondly a passenger train. If passengers wished to use it, they must put up with the delays necessary for the handling of freight. But he was anxious to do anything possible to help matters. He suggested that the train might be able to leave the other end of the route an hour earlier and thus arrive here at a reasonable hour.

This was admitted by the committee to be feasible and a promise was given to look closely into the matter.

Other matters in connection to Campbellton's again service were discussed and Mr. Brady promised to take the whole matter up at an early date.
