

VOTING IN TWO STATES.

THE REPUBLICANS IN OHIO AND IOWA YESTERDAY.

An immense Temperance Vote—the Back-eyes People Declare for Prohibition—the Political Results Thereof.

The state elections in Ohio and Iowa came off yesterday, the electors in each being called upon to choose a governor and a state legislator.

The candidates for governor in Ohio were Judge Foster, republican; Judge Hendley, democrat; Jenkins, greenback; and Schuman, prohibitionist.

The returns received last night were meagre and incomplete. In Ohio the republican claim that Foster will overcome Newman's (democratic secretary of state) majority, which was 10,000.
