CHAMBERLAIN A UNIONIST.

HE DECLARES HIS ANTI-GOVERNMENT TO THE "NEW RADICALS."

"Unionist," He Says, "is a Title Far Wider and Nobler Than Conservative or Liberal and Includes Both."—An Address at the New Radical Party Banquet.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—Joseph Chamberlain, leader of the Liberal-Unionists, in a speech at Birmingham this evening declared his entire antagonism to the new Radicalism which, he said, had abandoned the old Radical principles and become a policy of disintegration at home and abroad.

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AGGRAVATING.

THE WORST STORM OTTAWA HAS HAD IN 25 YEARS.

Joliette Wants the Great Northern Railway—President's Address to the Senate—Donald Cribb Postpones—West Indies Disentitled with the Reciprocity Treaty With the States.

OTTAWA, Jan. 30.—Last night's storm was the worst known in this section for over a quarter of a century. Indeed, there is no record of any storm when so much snow fell in so short a time. The record of the snowfall kept at the Experimental Farm shows that the record for yesterday was 22 inches in the 24 hours. The next highest record is 10 inches on Dec. 16 last year, and in the three previous winters during which there were figures have been kept at the farm, the greatest fall at one time did not exceed eight inches. The last "great" storm here was in 1885, when the snowfall was about 18 inches, but it was snowing almost continually for three days. Train service has been thoroughly demoralized both east and west, and for the first time in its history the electric car service in the city was knocked out for a while; not for long, however, as the snow having been cleared away, gangs were working all night last night and every man who wanted to get to work today.
