Should be Kept Free From Lice.

The Chicken Coop and the Young Chick It is very important, as the weather gets warmer, that both coops and chicks be kept absolutely clean and free from lice; you cannot afford to raise chicks to feed a swarm of lice with. will be many sudden showers and pos-sibly a cold rain this month; see that there is a handy place into which the chicks may run. The cockerels, if old enough to distinguish, should be separated from the flock and pushed ahead for all the growth they can make, and sold for broilers when about twelve weeks old. The pullets should be kept thriftily growing, and that is all. Do not force them, let them come to ma-turity under natural conditions, but do not let them stop growing a single day.
