CLAIM GAS REFEREE EXCEEDING POWERS

Farmers on Whose Property Gas is Being Secured Object to Change in Agreements.

TORONTO, Oct. 26.-A deputation of farmers appeared at the Parliament buildings to protest against the announced intention of Ontario Gas Referee Henderson to revise the basis upon which farmers are paid for natural gas taken from their properties by the Pro-vincial Natural Gas Company, of Niag-

ara Falls. At present the usual standard con-tract allows the farmers, annual rental, tract allows the farmers, annual rental, together with a free supply of gas ur to 400,000 cubic feet a year, with charge of 20 cents per thousand excess. The referee now proposes t charge the farmers for all gas used and leave the matter of rental to arbitration. The farmers hold that in adopting this course the referee is exceeding his powers.
