CANCER CURABLE IN EARLY STAGES

Dr. Woodbury gave a brief talk to the Progressive Club on public health work and the important part played in that work by the Red Cross, concluding with a request for the support of every member in the coming drive to be staged by the Red Cross for funds to carry on this important work. Dr. Woodbury cited the case of cancer as a public menace which was yet to be conquered, stating that if people would report to a physician when they found a lump or tumor on them the danger would be averted, as in its early localized stage cancer was curable. There were benign tumors that were not dangerous but often the smallest lump might be cancerous and as such should be removed before it continued its work of building up cells, where cells were not required, and thus causing the damage that a continually growing brick would do in a building if it pushed its way into places where concrete should be. Cancer, he said, was about the only disease that was not on the decrease in Nova Scotia and at present claimed about six per cent of the deaths in this country, whereas ten years ago it only claimed about four per cent. In the period from 1909-13 the death rate from cancer was 73 per 100,000; in 1913-15 it was 77 per 100,000, and in 1919-21 it was 85 per 100,000. Cancer claimed 500 deaths, and tuberculosis 700 annually.

Dr. Woodbury went on to say that as far as was known cancer was not contagious, for if it were most physicians would have it, nor was it a blood disease. Timely treatment would cure it, and the fight against it was one of the things the Red Cross aimed at in their public health programme.—(Halifax Chronicle.)
