

Solution: Trouvons d'abord la surface d'un secteur de 60° dans un cercle de 6 pieds de rayon.

$(6^2 \times 3.1416) \times 60/360 = 18.8496$ pieds carrés, la surface du secteur. Mais le secteur est composé du segment et d'un triangle ayant pour base la corde du segment et pour côtés le rayon du cercle.

Mais la corde d'un arc de $60^\circ =$ toujours le rayon du cercle $=$ dans le cas présent 6 pieds. Dans ce cas le triangle est donc équilatéral. Pour trouver la surface d'un triangle équilatéral on multiplie le carré du côté par .433013.

$6^2 \times .433013 = 15.588468$, la surface du triangle.

$18.8496 - 15.588468 = 3.261132$, la surface du segment.

11. On demande la surface et le volume d'un prisme rectangulaire de 5 pieds de hauteur, de 4 pieds de longueur et 3 pieds de largeur.

Solution: Si on appelle base du prisme le rectangle qui a pour côtés 4 pieds et 3 pieds, on aura :

$4 + 3 + 4 + 3 = 14$ pieds, périmètre de la base.

Multipliant 14, le périmètre de la base, par 5, la hauteur, on a 70 pieds carrés, la surface latérale.

$(4 + 3) \times 2 = 24$ pieds, la surface des deux bases.

70 pieds carrés la surface latérale + 24 pieds carrés la surface des bases = 94 pieds carrés la surface totale.

$4 \times 3 \times 5 = 60$ pieds cubes, le volume.

BURIED ALIVE

When the French army was retreating from Moscow, General Ornano, a Corsican, was severely wounded by the bursting of a Russian shell, which killed his horse.
