POLITICAL ARRESTS, AND SUBSEQUENT RIOTS. (The following, owing to some oversight, only appeared in a portion of our last week's issue.)

We regret to announce that the Government have seen fit to arrest a number of our fellow-citizens on charges arising out of the disturbances of April last.

On the morning of Wednesday, the 10th (says the Herald) the unusual display of military force at the Government House made it evident that some coup was intended, and a little before twelve o'clock we heard that the High Constable was engaged in executing warrants.

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FREE PASSAGE OF THE BRIG EUREKA, THROUGH THE ST. LAWRENCE.—Permission has been obtained from the British Government at London, for the brig Eureka, of Cleveland, to pass down the St. Lawrence on a voyage to California, and she is advertised to sail for San Francisco on or about the 20th of September next.

A gentleman at Cleveland interested in the enterprise writes, under date of Aug. 9th, to a commercial house in Oswego, that he has "the documents from London, England, dated May 24th, 1849, granting the Eureka leave to pass out through the St. Lawrence into the Atlantic—and she is here now fitting out, and will pass down through your lake about the 1st of October.

The price fixed for passage in the Cabin is \$200, and application for passage and freight will be received by the advertised agents on the day of sailing.

PROVINCIAL FAIR.—We understand that the proprietors of the Royal Mail Steamers have, with a view to their highly commendable, resolved to charge only half fare for persons desirous of attending the Agricultural Show at Kingston next month. Only half the usual rates will also be charged for the transport of cattle intended for exhibition.

We regret to learn from the Niagara Mail that Col. Dymally, of the Royal Artillery, is suffering from a severe form of cholera, and he is advertised to sail for San Francisco on or about the 20th of September next.

SEAT OF GOVERNMENT.—The Montreal Transcript says that the Governor General received despatches from England by the last mail relative to a change in the seat of the Provincial Government, Toronto and Quebec are both talked of, but the general impression appears to be that Toronto is the place decided upon.

It will be observed, by the reported proceedings of a meeting at St. John's, N. B., that the organization commenced at St. John's, is extending throughout the country, and is being conducted with a view to the projection into the Province.

MR. HINCK'S FINANCING.—A story was transmitted by Telegraph from Montreal, some ten days since, that Mr. Hink's, a well-known merchant, had been negotiating with some of our public works, for the purpose of raising a loan of £100,000 in Canadian Debentures at 6 per cent; and had obtained a loan of half a million, to complete our public works.

We regret to learn that a young woman, who was a patient in the Dispensary, had escaped the perils of the fire at the destruction of that building, perished in the conflagration of Friday night, in the house occupied by Mr. Murray. We are told that her screams were heard, and that some persons brought ladders, but that when they arrived with them, under the window was raised, so that she had come to the ground, consequently no attempt was made for her rescue. The whole was so dense, that the poor creature must have perished long before the flames reached her.

By the 26th section of the Act regulating Inland Bills of Exchange and Promissory Notes passed in the last Session of Parliament, the following fasts and festivals are declared to be holidays within the meaning of the Act, viz: Corpus Christi, Good Friday, Ascension, Corpus Christi, St. Peter and St. Paul's, Conception, and Christmas Day, the anniversary of, and day of celebration of Her Majesty's birth, and any day that may be fixed, by proclamation, for a general Fast, or a general thanksgiving.

Several strictly Roman Catholic holidays are included in this list, the necessity of observing which is not very palatable to Protestant Canada West. But their observance will be found to be of necessity in other matters, besides the religious, and in reference to the various classes of "The Interpretation Act," also passed in the last Session, it will be seen that in all Acts passed in that Session or passed in any future one, the word holiday is declared to include Sunday, and all the above mentioned holidays, except Conception Day, and Her Majesty's birth, and any day that may be fixed, by proclamation, for a general Fast, or a general thanksgiving.
