OTTAWA, April 1.-The recent regulation against sending money thru the mails, save by registered post, will be modified so as to exempt amounts not exceeding \$1, said Dr. Coulter, deputy postmaster-general, today. The change will be officially announced at

change will be officially announced at an early date. The regulation against sending money in unregistered letters was de-signed to remove the temptation from postal employes to steal from the mails, several cases of this kind hav-ing been detected in various eities. At present, letters violating the rule are being sent to the dead-letter office. It has been pointed out to the depart-ment that it is a hardship to compel the registration of trifling amounts, as the hazard of sending them unregis-tered does not justify the extra ex-pense.

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C.P.R. LIVE STOCK MARKET, MONTREAL. April 1.—At the Canadian Pacific Live Stock Market the receipts of live stock for the week ending March 28 were 700 cattle, 110 sheep and lambs, a 1100 hogs and 1250 calves. The offerings on the market this morning for sale were 800 cattle, 200 sheep and lambs, 500 hogs and 1300 calves. There was no actual change in the condition of the market for cattle since Monday, prices being about steady, be-cause of the smaller offerings. The de-mand was principally for small lots to fill actual wants for the balance of the saster trade, when butchers generally lay in large supplies in order to make a sood showing.
