

OLD MAN MAY DIE FROM ASSAULT OF THREE YOUTHS

George Gallinger, Aged 83, Was Brutally Beaten With Clubs —Assailants Arrested.

CORNWALL, Nov. 27.—(Special).—Fred Whyte, aged 18 years; Arthur Tio, aged 15, and James Tio, aged 16, were charged in the Cornwall police court this afternoon with the attempted murder of George Gallinger, who lives less than a mile from Cornwall with his 12-year-old grandson. The assault took place on Sunday night, when the three youths, who were 18, 15 and 16 years of age, went to the well for water after their grandfather, Bert Gallinger, had gone to Sunday school, and the three young men appeared and asked for a drink. When Mr. Gallinger passed them the tin bucket they threw the contents in his face and followed him with several blows over the head with clubs.

Assault Most Brutal. Just what happened afterwards does not seem very clear, but from the appearance of the pool of blood near the well and a trail of blood to beyond the barn and inside the house, the four blood-stained clubs found on the premises were used to inflict the injuries. The man, whose head was cut in several places and his eye knocked out of its socket, his nose was also broken.

It is said that after forcing entrance into the house the invaders tried to make Mr. Gallinger give them money. When the young grandson came home from Sunday school he was greatly alarmed by the noises from within the house and ran over to the home of Carson Gallinger, a nephew of the old man, who returned with him. Carson called upon the intruders to come out and surrender, and fired a shot from a revolver to intimidate them. The young men rushed out and Carson managed to capture Arthur Tio, who he fought desperately for his liberty. Later on he gave the names of his companions to Chief of Police Smith of Cornwall, to whom he was turned over by his captor. Before taking his prisoner to Cornwall, Carson Gallinger went after Henry Gallinger, son of the attacked man.

Victim's Condition Serious. Dr. A. Ross, who was summoned to attend Mr. Gallinger, whose injuries, owing to his advanced years, are considered very serious. Counties Crown Attorney Diaper, who was called for the crown and asked for the remand.

Whyte and Arthur Tio have a police court record, including the sending of the team of horses from Michael Gallinger for a Halloween frolic.

THORO INQUIRY INTO FILTRATION

Continued From Page 1. "a ghastly joke on the people of this city."

Ald. McBrien did not think it necessary to appoint a committee to investigate. "That is a reflection on the engineer's department. Let City Engineer Rust report," he advised. Would Be Reflection on Board. Others thought the matter should be sent to the board of control, but Ald. McCarthy pointed out that the board was required by statute to report monthly on the progress of all civic works, and it would be a reflection on them to ask them to report on what was naturally under their jurisdiction. "For my part, I would like to see an investigation," declared Ald. Chisholm. "If the facts are anywhere nearly as bad as Ald. Yeomans has painted them, some one should lose his position. Place the matter before Judge Winchester, and put it up to him to find out who is at fault."

"Should not Ald. Yeomans have taken this matter up with the city engineer?" asked Ald. Phelan. "There is no doubt that these charges will be greatly modified. If a special committee is appointed from council, no report will be returned this year. Send the matter to the county judge. This matter should not have been thrown to council to make political glory for anyone."

Ald. Dunn thought it would be better to first have the board of control decide whether there was anything that required investigating. "Remember that a lot of bombastic talk just before an election is usually untrue," was his charge to the council.

A letter from the gardeners and foresters urging that Chas. Chambers be appointed parks commissioner to succeed the late James Wilson, was read. This matter will be dealt with at the next meeting of the council.

Considerable opposition was made to the recommendation of the board of control that the corporation hand over the lands belonging to the city, affected under the Dominion Act of this province, to the Toronto harbor commission. Ald. Graham, seconded by Ald. Hill, requested that the recommendation be sent back to the board for information as to the value of the lands to be handed over, the revenue derived therefrom, the amount of taxes, the value of Ashbridge's bay and the marsh property, and whether the harbor commissioners intended to hand over the city the proceeds of all sales of lands of the Ashbridge's Bay property.

Reference was made to the fact that there is a strip of land 800 feet wide and at least two-thirds of a mile long separating the municipality of North Toronto from the city of Toronto. Mayor Geary pointed out that instructions had been given two months ago for a report on this land, but it was not yet ready. Ald. Phelan gave notice that he will move that the ratemakers on Jan. 1 be asked to answer the following question: "Are you in favor of legislation being asked to permit the city to expropriate the Toronto Railway Company at a price to be paid by arbitration?" He also gave notice that he will move that a referendum vote be called for on this question: "Are you in favor of legislation being asked to make the term of a controller two years, two an alderman two years, one to retire one year, two the following year?" After passing the accounts, council adjourned, the members hurrying away to prepare for the civic welcome to H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught. The big civic bylaws came up next Monday at a special meeting.

CENSURE HON. MR. FOY

St. Jean Baptiste Society Expresses Its "Utter Contempt."

OTTAWA, Nov. 27.—The St. Jean Baptiste Society of Holy Family Parish, Ottawa east, has passed a strong resolution supporting the French-Canadian Educational Association in its condemnation of Attorney-General Foy for his attacks on bilingualism. A section of the resolution read: "As citizens of Canada we look down with utter contempt at the narrow-mindedness of Mr. Foy. As Catholics we are ashamed to have our midst a man so unjust and so mean as to wish to cancel rights claimed by human nature, Christian and Catholic spirit, the constitution of the country and British fair play." They furthermore want to declare for Mr. Foy's own benefit and that of his friends—if he has any—that the French-Canadian parents are more than ever sanguine of having French taught their children, without neglecting the study and teaching of English.
