

Saunders Denies Story Of Fires in the North

Frederickhouse, Ontario, July 20.—(Cochran P.O., Ont. July 19.) Editor World: Immediately upon receipt of this letter I call upon you to retract all of the statements made in The World and also to give that retraction the same prominence the article originally received. In the first place I am not an Ontario Government employee and have never been in any way connected with a road gang. I have never been described as lawless and irresponsible by any person other than your informant. I did not start a blaze which destroyed miles of forest and many homes and I have never described a bush fire as a great joke. The fire started by me on July 20 to burn the slash around my house, outside of burning a canoe and running thru a field of oats, did no damage and it did not travel along the Frederickhouse River or Muskegon.

My fire was started with the full consent of Mr. and Mrs. Hall and was assisted by Mr. Hall, Jr., to burn and also by Mr. Riddell (a close neighbor). The fire did not jump the Muskegon or Frederickhouse, and it did not burn the house of Mr. Gray. Neither did it go within two miles of Langdon's clearing.

There was no fire at McKimley's on July 20 and Burrows' shack was burned by their own fire. The twenty-acre slash referred to in your article was burned and the bush fire caused by same had been traveling towards me for nine hours before the fire was started on my clearing. It was this fire that burned Conn Smythe's house. The fire did not at any time endanger Holden's "fine house." It did not cross the Muskegon west and the wind did not change to the southeast at any time on July 20.

Mr. Hanson took his family out of the bush as he had taken a contract to clear bush for a neighbor. It was not an account of fire, but because he wished to be near his work. Mr. Blythe has not taken his family out of the bush. I do not consider myself lawless or irresponsible and as I have the respect and esteem of almost all my neighbors, am not so considered by them. I have never bragged nor boasted about having started a fire and I look upon bush fires as any-

thing but a joke. I have never made a statement that it is an affair of mine if I burn out a neighbor, but I have at times stated that it is up to every settler to get out and burn and make his house safe from fire which may at any time come thru on him. I have never at any time said or supposed that I have a right to endanger the lives and property of others. The truth of these statements is verified by all the people supposed to have suffered by an act of mine and to be at my mercy. In the face of these facts you can not hesitate to contradict in full the report of July 19 and also to send me the name of the person who for pure reasons of spite connected this infamous lie. Saunders.

PANAMA CANAL IS PART OF U. S.

Purchase of Panama Zone
Superseded Treaty Claim
Made in Senate—Need
Not Arbitrate.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Senator Smith of South Carolina, speaking on the canal bill, today contended in the senate that the purchase by the United States Government of the Panama zone changed the relations of the United States with Great Britain and superseded the Hay-Pauncefote treaty of 1901. He expressed the belief that the United States has now a right to use the water of the Panama Canal in any way it pleases.

"Whether we shall submit to arbitration a question which pertains only to the internal domestic affairs of the United States," was declared by Mr. Smith as the real question.

The Panama bill was not formally before the senate, his remarks being made during consideration of the sundry civil bill.

Senator Smith called attention to the fact that the United States had never submitted to arbitration the claims of Colombia for redress for the loss of Panama.

"The fact that it has not been arbitrated does not relieve the United States from its responsibility," said Senator Bacon. "It is still a burning question and it is to our eternal disgrace that we should have treated a weaker nation as we have Colombia."

Senator Lodge declared that while he believed the United States has the right under the Hay-Pauncefote treaty to give concessions to American ships, yet he believed it would be impossible to secure an international court unbiased enough to rule in favor of the United States. The interest of all other nations, he said, would weigh against the claims of the United States.

JAPAN DENIES MAKING TREATY

No Agreement With Russia
Indicating Zones of Influence, is Official Statement
Given Out.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—(Can. Press.)—Formal denial of the publication statement that a treaty between Japan and Russia looking to the definition of their respective interests in Manchuria and Mongolia was about to be signed at St. Petersburg, has reached the state department from the American embassy at Tokyo.

The embassy based its denial on information furnished by the Japanese foreign office. State department officials have nothing to say to reconcile the issue thus raised between St. Petersburg and Tokyo.

The unofficial opinion is expressed here that even if a treaty is in incubation it might be found to be nothing more than an agreement between the two powers not to interfere with each other in certain definite zones and such an agreement would have no binding force upon any other nation not a party to the agreement and which did not care to be bound by its provisions. Thus, it is pointed out, it could not materially affect the status quo in China or even in Manchuria or Mongolia, so far as concerns the maintenance of the open door and the right of Great Britain, Germany, France or the United States to exercise the privileges or rights there as Japan or Russia.

Caroline Fire Destroys House.

ST. CATHARINES, July 19.—(Special.)—The residence of Albert H. Dyke at Port Dalhousie, a well-known lawyer of this city, was completely razed to the ground by a fire on Sunday. A gasoline stove exploded and started the blaze, which baffled efforts of the volunteer brigade, which worked hard to put it out. The house and all contents were entirely destroyed.

The blaze came near to having fatal results, a little child who was in the building narrowly escaping suffocation.

Toronto Swimming Club.

The 100 yards free style race at the club Saturday afternoon was won by R. Lowndes in 1:41.25. W. Stevenson was second. FIRST IN THE WORLD
Hospital for Consumptive Children
Being Rushed to Completion.

A new pavilion and a new cottage in course of construction at the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives. When these are completed, the accommodation for patients at the two Muskoka institutions will be increased to three hundred.

New buildings at the Hospital for Consumptives near Weston are also being rushed forward. These include a large fireproof hospital to replace the buildings destroyed by fire some time ago, and a new hospital for consumptive children. The corner-stone of this latter institution was laid by the Duke of Connaught recently. The hospital is the first of its kind in the world. Two new long pavilions are also being erected.

With the completion of these buildings, the total accommodation for consumptives at Muskoka and Weston will be increased to six hundred patients by the close of the year.
