GERMAN DEAD THICK ON AVRE-LUCE FRONT

London, April 2.—The British official statement today is as follows: "In the course of the fighting yesterday in the area between the Avre and the Luce Rivers we captured 50 prisoners and 13 machine guns."

"A large number of German dead were found on the ground in this locality by us, and two counter-attacks attempted by the enemy later in the day were broken up with heavy losses by our artillery."

"On the remainder of the front successful raids, in which we secured several prisoners and killed a number of the enemy, were carried out in the neighborhood of Acherville and Zonnebeker."

CLEMENCEAU UNDER FIRE

French Premier's Automobile Ventures Too Close to Fighting Lines.

Paris, April 2.—Premier Clemenceau, while making his daily visit to the front yesterday, ventured so near the first line that his automobile was shelled vigorously by the German artillery.

HEAVY ARTILLERY FIRE MARKS BATTLEFIELD

Paris, April 2.—The war office reports: "The night was relatively calm on the front between the Oise and the Somme. The artillery fighting became rather heavy along some parts of the battlefield."

ENEMY RIGHT WING SEVERELY CHECKED

London, April 2.—It is estimated that fifty divisions (600,000 men) were used by the Germans between Arras and Moreuil (about 37 miles) in an air line, fifteen of which have been put out of commission for the time.

The enemy has not risked a general battle since Thursday. The small advances made were seldom accomplished by direct assault, but by infiltrations and the flanking of local positions.

The occupation of the high ground has been of the same character. While the Germans are struggling to bring up artillery and materiel across a difficult country to replace the divisions which have been in action for days without sleep, preparatory to the next "kick-off," there is reason to believe that another attack will be made on the north flank, toward Arras and Vimy.

"So far as Alsace-Lorraine is concerned, we decline all leagues and congresses."

AMERICAN GAS MASKS

Washington, April 2.—Charges that German spies had intercepted two vital gas masks intended for use in France were made in the senate today by Senator Thomas of Colorado, who declared that in one factory 2,000 out of 6,000 masks were found defective.

Amsterdam, April 2.—A leading German manufacturer, writing in the Nord Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, says: "Out of 1,700 spinning and weaving mills 70 are still running at high pressure, while in the boot and shoe industry 1,400 factories have been amalgamated into 500. In the oil industry 15 factories working at high pressure have been formed out of 720 works previously existing. In the wool silk industry the number of spindles has been reduced from 45,000 to 2,500."

CELTIC GAINS PORT

Big White Star Liner, The Damaged By Torpedo, Arrives in English Haven.

New York, April 2.—The big White Star Line steamship Celtic, which was torpedoed a day or two ago while on a voyage to the United States, has reached a British port safely.

PARIS STILL SHELLED

Paris, April 2.—The eighth long range bombardment of Paris began at 10:10 o'clock today, when a projectile exploded in the region of the city.

WAR WITH BULGARIA

Washington, April 2.—In favorably reporting a bill to impose drastic penalties on disloyal acts, the Senate Judiciary Committee today adopted an amendment, prescribing imprisonment for twenty years and \$10,000 fine for "whoever shall by word or act support or favor the cause of the German Empire or its allies in the present war, or by word or act oppose the cause of the United States therein."

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LEAGUE OF NATIONS CALLED IMPOSSIBLE

Amsterdam, April 2.—For the first time in Germany, a semi-official league of nations was called impossible. The statement as published in the German papers says: "The league of nations could offer any guarantee of lasting peace among men. The nations would perhaps greet such a league with enthusiasm, but in due time they would learn to curse it, because it could not fail to deceive all their hopes most cruelly."

CANADIAN MOTOR GUNS PLAY GALLANT PART

Canadian Associated Press Cable. London, April 2.—Canadian motor guns played a gallant and useful part in the Canadian motor machine guns, which were particularly pressed into duty when the enemy's tanks were broken up into the enemy's hands.

New York, April 2.—An Associated Press dispatch from Fort Worth, Texas, today says: "The British Royal Flying Corps, commanded by Brigadier-General Hoare, of the Indian Flying Corps, has been training here since October. The training will be resumed in the near future."

AVIATOR RECEIVES VICTORIA CROSS

Awarded by the King for Accounting for Fifty Enemy Airplanes.

London, April 2.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—The King has approved the award of the Victoria Cross to Second Lieutenant and Temporary Captain James Byford McCudden of the Royal Flying Corps, who had previously been awarded the Distinguished Service Order and the Military Cross and bar and the Military Medal.

The Victoria Cross has been awarded for most conspicuous bravery, exceptional presence of mind and initiative and very high devotion to duty. McCudden had previously accounted for fifty-four enemy airplanes, of which 42 were definitely destroyed, including nineteen in our lines. Only twelve out of the fifty-four were driven down out of control. McCudden twice totally destroyed four two-seater enemy airplanes in the same day, and on the last occasion all four machines were destroyed in ninety minutes.
