
"SOVEREIGN"



There are five separate and complete boiler sections in the "Sovereign," each bolted separately to the water post. This arrangement saves in the cost of erection, and it divides the boiler into a number of complete units. One boiler section may be used for heating water for the bath without interfering with the satisfactory working of the boiler as a house-heating apparatus. And if the matter of replacing a section is to be considered, the defective part may be removed without dismantling the whole apparatus. Or one section may be disconnected from the water circulation without affecting the circulation through the other sections. Accidents, which necessitate the removal of a section of the "Sovereign," are few, but such a thing might occur in a vacant house as allowing the water to freeze in the boiler. This would crack the metal. Apart from this the probability of accident is remote. However, the removable sections provide for economical and handy replacements when required.




