ORGANIZED TO RESIST ORGANIZATION

The coal operators who refused to have anything to do with organized labor or listen to the entreaties of the President of the United States are not quite the men who ought to talk about maintaining the honor and dignity of law and order and the preservation of public peace. They pointed out that the governor of Pennsylvania and the legislature of that State were bound to preserve the peace and allow men to go to work who wished to go to work. To this nobody can make any objection. But if the governor of Pennsylvania and the legislature of Pennsylvania are unequal to the duties which the operators say now devolve upon them, it is largely because public government in the State of Pennsylvania has been debauched and demoralized by corporations in the most infamous way. We do not know of any State government so demoralized as has been that of Pennsylvania by corporations and financial grabbers. The way the city of Philadelphia has been raided and robbed by corporations, the way the great coal mining companies have engineered legislation in their own interests and against the interests of the public in consequence of that hoodluming rife, that there is little respect for law and the rights of the people and that Quayism, as it is called, is a synonym for conspiracy against the public welfare. The coal operators represent men who have loaded up the coal railways and coal companies with hundreds of millions of dollars of watered stock, on which they expect the suffering public to pay fat dividends and the miners to take the lowest possible wages. One would think that there is anything, next to fresh air and water, that the people were entitled to, it would be that they were entitled, at a reasonable price, to enough coal taken out of the ground where God put it for the benefit of man. On the contrary, the coal is cornered by the great companies, its production is limited, its weight is manipulated and the whole system of shipment is so managed that no independent source of supply can get sufficient cars for transportation, and in a hundred ways the monopolies hamper the transfer of the fuel from the mines to the consumer. In a word, the public are tied up to these great monopolistic corporations and to their enormously watered companies and to these methods, which are arbitrary against the public interest and pre-eminently of a raiding and filibustering character. Under the pretence of fighting organized labor the mine owners are really fighting for the continued enslavement of the people of the North American continent to them, and to maintain their exorbitant prices for one of the necessities of life.

WANT EXTENDED CAR LINES

Northwest Ratepayers Keep Up Agitation for Improvements. Residents of the northwest portion of the city will continue agitating for an extension of the street railway line from Lansdowne-avenue to Dundas-street. They decided upon this course at a meeting held in Dupuy's conservatory Monday evening. When the agitation for the extension was commenced some time ago the residents were told by the government, before they pressed the matter, that the request should be made to the Toronto Railway Company, and in view of this representation will be made to the company to urge the matter upon the government. An extension of the line on Dupont-street to Lansdowne-avenue will also be asked for. G. F. Scott presided and the attendance was large. Various other plans of improvement were discussed, but nothing of a definite character was decided upon. Purchases of land for improvements will take place at the next meeting on the first Monday in November. Aid should be asked to deliver an address on municipal citizenship.

WANT RELIEF FOR IRELAND

Branch of the United Irish League Organized in Toronto. The organization meeting of the branch of the United Irish League, held in Pythian Hall Monday evening, was largely attended. D. J. O'Donohue was elected chairman pro tem, and E. J. Sullivan, secretary. The constitution of the Ottawa branch was adopted, and a committee, composed of Messrs. Hearn, Cunnery and O'Donohue, was appointed to revise the same. The object of the United Irish League, as stipulated in the constitution, is as follows: "Full national self-government for Ireland; the abolition of landlordism in Ireland by means of a universal and compulsory system of land purchase; the restoration to the Irish people of the right of disposal of the land; the redistribution of the grazing ranches in Connaught and the reinstatement of the evicted tenants; complete educational equality for all creeds in Ireland; complete equality throughout Ireland of a law providing agricultural laborers with cottages and one allotment; the abolition of the right to challenge jurors in political cases except for cause; the preservation of the Gaelic language as part of the struggle for Irish national freedom. Speeches were delivered by Messrs. John Hearn, Cunnery, Hearn, J. G. O'Donohue, J. and P. Kennedy. The membership fee was fixed at \$1, and John Hearn was elected treasurer pro tem. The election of officers will take place next Monday night in the same hall. In the afternoon an introductory meeting of the branch will be held, at which the speakers will be asked to deliver an address on municipal citizenship.

MAY SOLVE FUEL PROBLEM

Immense Flow of Natural Gas Discovered Near Port Robinson, Welland County. OORLESS AND GIVES INTENSE HEAT. Canal Superintendent Weller Feels, However, That May Be Merely Marsh Gas.

St. Catharines, Oct. 6.—The discovery of an immense flow of natural gas at Port Robinson has created great excitement thru this district, and it is felt that it will help to solve the fuel problem so far as St. Catharines and the Niagara Peninsula are concerned. The flow was first ascertained by the employees of Phil & Co., canal, and whose attention was directed to gurgling sounds and a roaring beneath the surface of the water of the Welland Canal. The discovery of immense quantities of gas was made in the lower part of the canal, and it is felt that it will help to solve the fuel problem so far as St. Catharines and the Niagara Peninsula are concerned. The flow was first ascertained by the employees of Phil & Co., canal, and whose attention was directed to gurgling sounds and a roaring beneath the surface of the water of the Welland Canal. The discovery of immense quantities of gas was made in the lower part of the canal, and it is felt that it will help to solve the fuel problem so far as St. Catharines and the Niagara Peninsula are concerned.

To Sink a Well

There is a positive knowledge of its extent or quantity, but there is undoubtedly an almost unlimited quantity there. The gas is of the best quality, being odorless, burning with a blue flame, and producing no soot or ash.
