Walsh, secretary of the associated charities, is preparing the report of bis trip to England and is also taking what can be done in this city. He has viewed a number of properties and decided urbs. Land in "the ward" is held at too It is proposed to build houses that will cost about \$1000 or \$1100 and between \$50,000 and \$100,000 will be spent this

Of all the buildings for which permits have been issued this year, only about forty have been such as workingmen can afford to rent.

The funds for building purposes have already been secured, seme Toronto capitalists having agreed to go into the scheme and the balance having been arranged for in England. Mr. Walsh is satisfied that the hivestment will return a revenue of three or four per cent at least. He has secured a million brick and will be ready to begin construction as soon as the necessary formalities are concluded.

He will not consider for a moment the idea that the movement will result in the housing of paupers, as the construction will be done on a purely ousiness basts and the houses rented to men who are now unable to secure sanitary and comfortable dwellings on account of the prevailing high rentals.
