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## Big Labor Demonstration is Planned for Hamilton

### Coroner's Jury Finds Fault With Condition of Street Between Car Tracks

Hamilton, July 15.—(Special.)—The trades and labor council delegates this evening discussed plans for a big labor demonstration to be held here on labor day. The council repudiated responsibility for the circular directed against the Turbine Steamship Company, which was accused of employing non-union men to paint the turbine. The officials of the company say they did not know that some of the painters employed did not belong to the union, and they wanted to meet representatives of the council to talk the matter over. The retail clerks asked for support in extending their organization. Gladys Webber, North Wentworth street, rolled over an embankment at the Dundas Park this afternoon and broke her leg.

Had it not been for the heavy shipments, which were this season diverted to the United States, the average price, and a leading commission man, would have been a good deal higher.

### ROYAL MOUNTED POLICE

Royal, Muskoka, July 15.—The body of Ritchie Powell, the Toronto boy drowned near here yesterday afternoon, was recovered this afternoon, about 4 o'clock, after being in the water over 24 hours. Boys have been dragging the lake since the accident occurred, but without success. The grisly-stricken father arrived from Toronto this morning, and joined in the search, and it was he who discovered the body lying in about six feet of water. The remains will be shipped to Toronto to-morrow morning, where internment will take place Sunday. The body of Miss Wards, who was drowned while trying to rescue Powell, was shipped to Toronto this afternoon, accompanied by the sorrowing family.

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## Houses for Workingmen will soon be under way

### Necessary Funds Secured and Suburbs Chosen as Proper Location

The project for building houses for workingmen along the lines of the system now in operation in the large cities of Great Britain will very soon assume a definite shape. Frank J. Walsh, secretary of the associated charities, is preparing the report of his trip to England and is also taking active steps to show in a practical way what can be done in this city. He has viewed a number of properties and decided that the houses must be built in the suburbs. Land in "the ward" is held at too high a price to allow of it being considered and the movement of factories to the outlying districts makes it desirable that dwellings should be constructed there. It is proposed to build houses that will cost about \$1000, \$1200 and between \$3000 and \$4000 and will be spent this year. The summary: He has secured a million brick and will be ready to begin construction as soon as the necessary conditions are concluded. He will not build for a moment the idea that the movement will result in the housing of paupers, as the construction will be done on a purely business basis. The houses are to be built in the suburbs, where the rents are low and the cost of building is not so high as in the city.
