—The Hamilton branch of the Commercial Travelers' Association will present the Hamilton city hospital with a set of electric bells and annunciators.
—A number of the merchants of the city will ask the council to proclaim Monday, July 2 a public holiday instead of Saturday, July 1, so that the market will not be interfered with.
—Superintendents P. P. Brady, of Smith's Falls, and Thomas Williams, of London, of the C. P. R., were in Toronto yesterday, and waited upon General Superintendent Leonard.
—The song recital to be given by Mr. Ernest Gamble, bass, in the Auditorium, on Friday, May 19, will doubtless be largely attended. All subscribers will have first choice of seats.

THE CASE OF MARION BROWN
Minister of Justice Expected Here Tomorrow.
Within the past week a decided change is said to have come over the condemned prisoner, Marion Brown. Up to a few days ago his conversation was of a very unbecoming nature, but as the day appointed for execution draws near, the doomed man realizes his awful fate. He reads his Bible daily, and eats and sleeps well. His anxiety to learn the result of the petition for commutation increases as days go by. Brown is very modest in his request for delicacies. A day or two ago he asked for some pigs' feet, which were supplied. He greatly enjoys a cigar, and spends the greater part of his time reading and reflecting. It has been stated by those in a position to know that if Brown is executed he will make a general confession at the scaffold. The prisoner's counsel has received a telegram stating that Hon. David Mills, minister of justice, will be in the city tomorrow.

CITY HALL NOTES
The board of education has been called to meet at 4:30 this afternoon, the finance committee at 5 o'clock and the council at 8 p.m. The business of each meeting is to discuss estimates for the year.
The mayor has been making an effort to have the board of education reduce its estimates \$4,000. Then a 20-mill rate would be possible, he says. Members of the board express their willingness to make every possible concession, and say that in view of the high rate this year they would rather risk a small deficit than a surplus; but no reduction can be made on the public school estimates. Trustee MacRobert left the city on a business trip this afternoon before the meeting. When asked if he was favorable to a reduction of the estimates, he said: "The high school estimates might be cut, but not those of the public schools. The overruns for the high school had to be honored, anyway, and even if the council appropriate only \$10,000, the board might spend \$20,000. So the reductions of the estimates on that score made very little difference on the board."

NOGRAVEYARD VOTES
Proposal to Hold Bye-Elections on Latest Revised List.
[C. P. R. Special to the Advertiser.]
Ottawa, May 9.—The Dominion Government has under consideration the question of amending the elections act, so that when a bye-election takes place in any province of the Dominion it will be held on the latest revised lists. There is no immediate intention of doing this, but it will likely be accomplished in the near future.

STRIKES IN CANADA
Dubious Prospects of a Settlement in Montreal—Situation in Toronto Looks Better.
STRIKES IN CANADA L'40c, Olo
Montreal, May 9.—There is no new development in either of the big strikes here, except, if anything, that they are more serious. The local committees are perfecting arrangements for a long fight.
Toronto, May 9.—The trend of the labor troubles in the city yesterday was strongly towards settlement. The most important development of the day was the unanimous decision of the builders to refer the difficulty with the bricklayers to Judge McDougall as arbitrator.
A report gained currency that the stonecutters had about reached a settlement with their employers, but it was found that negotiations had not yet reached any definite stage.
COTTON OPERATIVES' STRIKES ENDED.

Montreal, May 9.—The strike of the 150 operatives of the Merchants' Cotton Company is ended, the strikers today agreeing to accept the offer of the company of an all round increase of 6 1/2 per cent.

DRAFTS PAYABLE IN THE YUKON DISTRICT.
The following from the Klondike Miner will be of interest to those doing business with the Yukon: As a passing word of advice to persons intending bringing negotiable drafts with them into this country, we would advise them to do so through the local institutions, as otherwise they will be at a considerable loss. There are various banking institutions outside, not represented here, who are advertising that they will issue drafts on Dawson trading companies at 1 per cent. When those drafts are presented at the banks drawn on are forced to pay in gold dust, which when sold to the banks here realizes \$15 per ounce. Hence, a \$100 draft, costing at the rate of \$101, outside, realizes \$85 in Dawson.
APPEAL DISMISSED IN DIVISION COURT.
Before Rose, J. MacMahon, J.:
Re Parke-Bartram (London), the informant in person, appealed from order of Robertson, J., refusing a mandamus to the police magistrate for the city of London, commanding him to issue a warrant upon the information and complaint in writing of William Henry Bartram, taken on oath before the said magistrate that Charles A. Kingston had committed in the city of London an indictable offense against the criminal code, 1892, of wilful and malicious perjury. He quoted Reg. v. Percy, L. R. 9, Q. B. 84, and Reg. v. Adamson, L. Q. B. D., 201, decided under the imperial statute 11 and 12, Vict. ch. 44, section 5, which he contended was similar in its terms to R. S. O. ch. 88, section 6. No one opposed the appeal. The court held that the Queen's bench divisional court of the Queen's bench divisional court in this case is provided by R. S. O., ch. 88, section 6. Appeal dismissed.

JOHN KENSIT MAKES A SCENE
In the Archbishop's Court Convened at Lambeth Palace.
The Noted Anti-Ritualist's Appeal Cut Short by Adjournment—U. S. Medal for Sir John Murray—Samoa Is Serene.
London, May 9.—There was a scene during today's sitting of the archiepiscopal court, which convened yesterday for a hearing of the charges of ritualistic practices against Rev. Henry Westall, vicar of St. Cuthberts, Philbeach Gardens, and Rev. John Ram, vicar of the Church of St. John, Timber Hill, Norwich.
During the proceedings John Kensit the noted anti-ritualist, arose from his seat at the back of the guard room of Lambton Palace, where the court is sitting, and shouted: "I wish to protest against the holding of this court. Mr. Kensit then began to read a written protest against the so-called spiritual court, and especially against an inquiry 'by your graces, who for two years have deliberately set at naught your solemn ordination and have allowed and often promoted well-known lawbreakers in the church.'"
A storm of hisses greeted the protest, and the Archbishop of Canterbury, the most Rev. Frederick Temple, cut Mr. Kensit short by adjourning the court for luncheon, amid cheers and derisive laughter.
U. S. MEDAL FOR SIR JOHN MURRAY.
The Manchester Guardian says the gold medal of the American Geographical Society will be presented to Sir John Murray, the celebrated naturalist, on the occasion of the annual meeting of the Royal Geographical Society in June. The presentation will be made by United States Ambassador Choate.

SERENITY IN SAMOA.
Apla, Samoa, May 9.—Via Auckland, N. Z. May 9.—Everything is quiet on the island. Operations have been suspended pending the arrival of the joint commission from San Francisco.
WHAT MILLIONAIRE CARNEGIE WILL DO.
The London correspondent of a morning paper quotes Mr. Andrew Carnegie in an interview as saying, in answer to the question regarding the disposition of his fortune of \$200,000,000, "I intend to complete the distribution of my wealth, reserving only a provision against any anxiety for the future of my daughter. She will not be a great heiress."
"My time will be spent in searching out good objects, both in America and Great Britain, and in writing."
SMALLPOX SPREADS.
Berlin, May 9.—In spite of precautionary measures, virulent smallpox is spreading. The disease was imported into Germany by Russian laborers, and had spread already to Iserhohn, Wiersburg and Hanover. French cases are also reported at Quedlinburg, Rietzsch and Neuhaldensleben. There have been twenty cases thus far reported.
