Is the earth made up of three con-
centric spheres? A physicist says that
such is the case. The solid nucleus he
supposes to be between 3,000 and 7,000
miles in diameter and this is surround-
ed by a liquid substratum, outside of
which is the crust, variously estimated
at 70 to 200 miles in thickness. More
than two centuries ago a similar theory
including the slow rotation of the inner
solid sphere on a different axis from
that of the entire globe, was held by
Dr. Edmund Halley to account for the
changes in the earth's magnetism. The
axis of the nucleus was thought to have
been originally that of the entire globe
and to the change of its course was
attributed the deluge. This earth's
internal heat, it is now pointed out,
may be accounted for by the friction
of the differently rotating bodies.

REPORT ON ELECTROLYSES

Big Water Main Is All Right — Gas
and Sewer Pipes Affected.

Engineer Knudson's report regarding
electrolysis in the water mains and gas
pipes of London, has been received by
the water commission. The report was
made at the instance of the City Gas
Company and the city, each agreeing
to pay one-half the cost.

The report states that the Spring-
bank line is not seriously affected, and
the current which escapes from the
trolley line finds its way back to the
power house via the river instead of
by the main.

The main was, however, found to be
pitted at the corner of York and
Thames streets, where as high as
seven volts were located.

Mr. Knudson says that the track
bonds of the street railway company
are somewhat poor.

The water pipes and gas mains
throughout the city are also more or
less affected with electrolysis.

As a remedy the engineer suggests
that the railway company be requested
to re-bond such tracks as have been
pointed out in this report as defective,
and to place such auxiliary overhead
track feeders in the negative districts
that will bring their currents back to
the power house with but little flow
through the mains.
