Amsterdam, March 17.—Eitel Friedrich Hohenzollern, second son of the former German emperor, the Klein Journal of Berlin says, has commenced divorce proceedings against his wife, charging infidelity before the war. The paper adds that when the former prince attempted to begin proceedings before the war, his father vetoed the plan.

GERMAN GOVT. MERE PUPPETS

That Monarchist Reaction is Growing.

London, March 17.-Special dispatches om Berlin report that the suppression recent Spartacan outbreak there shown that a military and monarch-eaction is growing and overshadow-the new government. The Berlin correspondent of the Mail, who on February 27 sent a dispatch outlining plans for a monarchist uprising in Germany, has arrived in London, having left Berlin on March 14 after a residence there of three months. He reiterates the statements made in his dispatch, saying that President Ebert. Chancellor Scheidemann and Minister of War Noske are merely puppets. He declares that for the purpose of retaining power they have allowed members of the military easts to reare nembers of the military caste to reap ear as organizers of the new republi can armies.
"These men are the real governors of Germany." he says. "They make the edicts and Chancellor Scheidemann and his colleagues willingly sign them."

GOVT. MAY PROMISE REVISION OF TARIFF

> Move Contemplated To Meet Demands of the West.

Ottawa, March 17.—That the Government will meet the demands of the West for tariff reductions by a promise of a complete revision of the tariff within the next year, is a suggestion heard here this morning. A promise along these lines, it is thought by some, will be made at the caucus to be held on Thursday, at which tariff matters will be exclusively discussed. A promise of tariff revision would be in addition to any amount of reduction the Government may be willing to make, and which might possibly include the removal of the seven and a half per cent general increase, imposed as war revenue measure.
