

CLOSING SESSION AFFIRMS NEED OF ACTION AT ONCE

By Unanimous Vote, Gathering CAFES RAIDED; United States Congress to Proceed Without Delay With Negotiations.

DETROIT, July 24.—(By Canadian Press).—By a unanimous vote the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Tidewater Congress, at its closing session at the Detroit Board of Commerce this morning, passed the report presented by the resolution committee, which was read by the chairman. William George Bruce, of Milwaukee.

"The project to connect the great inland oceans of the United States and Canada with the salt seas through a deep waterway route is not only physically feasible, but promising of a most utilitarian service to both nations. To unite the Great Lakes with the Atlantic Ocean through the intermediary of the St. Lawrence River will not only bring the great producing section of the country many miles nearer the markets of the world. Such communication will not only tend to a better distribution of immigration to the interior, where it is most needed, but also stimulate its producing ability, enable a more economic distribution of its commodities and provide for a more equitable participation in the nations' domestic and foreign commerce.

"We urge, in the event of a favorable report at the hands of the international joint commission, that the national congress proceed without delay to the introduction of legislation to enable the necessary negotiations tion in the nations' domestic and for- Windsor, lay to the introduction of legislation to enable the necessary negotiations between the Government of the United States and the Dominion of Canada. The construction labors involved in improving the St. Lawrence River with adequate locks and canals and power plants should be undertaken at the earliest possible moment after the two countries have decided upon the acceptance of the project and have reached an understanding on the financial consideration to be met.


Bichloride of Mercury Administered in Mistake For Baby's Tablets.


