

## MEXICO DEALS SQUARE BANK OF NOVA SCOTIA WITH FOREIGN CAPITAL

Some Interesting Facts Concerning the Interesting Republic Far South.

"The Mexican of to-morrow is the exican of to-day," said President Turnbull in introducing A. E. Stillwell, dent of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railway, to the Canadian Club

Mr. Stillwell believed that Canadians did not need any introduction to Mexico when he knew that the Mexican Heat, Light & Power Co. was a Canadian corporation. That company had carled 54,000,000 passengers last year, feubling its traffic, and he expected rom the rate of growth of Mexico City that they would soon be carrying 100,-10,000

Mexican laws were so good that when Mexican laws were so good that when you got a good thing you did not fear the laws would be changed to make it a bad thing. In his company's charter a tariff of maximum rates was settled, and they knew that for ninetynine years they could depend on having the same conditions. They would not be compelled to lower their rates until they wanted.

Mexico must be a corporation paradise according to Mr. Stillwell's account. When he asked the president for a certain concession he was told that his projected line paralleled an

"Only within seventy-five miles," Mr. Stillwell objected. Nevertheless the line would divide the traffic with the existing one, would tap its seaport, would lessen its dividends, and render capital that much less secure, and Mexico that much less attractive to the foreign investor.

tal that much less secure, and Mexico that much less attractive to the foreign investor. Nothing is too good for the foreigner, is the Mexican principle, if he comes with development schemes.

When Mr. Stillwell asked the concession for his line, which Gen. Grant had at one time tried to finance, he laid the plans before the government at 3 o'clock one afternoon and received his concession at 10 next morning.

All rates are fixed in advance, so that the public are considered as well as the companies. No train can be run until every bridge has been tested, the ties counted, the rails weighed, the telegraph system examined, a full line of tickets provided, and the speed of trains arranged. All these things must be approved by the government, and nothing but permanent work on the road is permitted. No frame bridges or emporary culverts are allowed.

Recent Ottawa Decision Will Probably Result in Some Remed-

ial Legislation. the Rideau Club, Ottawa, against a business tax, furnishes a precedent that,

business tax, furnishes a precedent that, in the opinion of City Solicitor Chisholm, means that no club in Toronto, the holding a liquer license, will be liable to business assessment.

Under the Assessment Act, a business tax, when levied, is on a basis of 50 per cent, of the assessed value of the land and building in which the commercial enterprise is carried on. As the act has been administered, all such clubs as the National, Toronto, Albany, Victoria, Granite, R.C.Y.C. and Toronto Rowing Club have been subject to such

the National, Toronto, Albany, Victoria, Granite, R.C.Y.C. and Toronto Rowing Club have been subject to such assessment, but it now appears, under the construction placed upon the act, that payment cannot be forced.

As showing the extent to which the city would suffer, it may be pointed out that the assessment on the new National Club building alone is \$80,000; Toronto Club, \$38,500, and, Albany Club, \$17,600. Adding the value of the land, taking half of the total and estimating the assessment at 18 mills, it may be readily calculated that the city would be the loser by several thousand dollars each year.


