A Canadian general conference officer said to The World that it would be interesting to ncte how far racial prejudices among southern Methodists had abated during

The African element will be quite prominent, as it will have in the conference 58 delegates from its three branches, as compared with 34 from the Capadian general conference. The conference will cost \$16,000, to be defrayed by an assessment of \$55 upon each delegate.

HOSPITAL COMMITTEE
