Citizens' Sunday Car Association Manifesto.

TORONTO, APRIL 28th, 1897.

As the voters of Toronto will be called upon shortly to decide whether a Sunday Car Service shall be permitted or not, the undersigned desire, with all respect for the opinions of others who regard the question differently, to bring to the notice of their fellow-citizens some of the reasons which induce them to favor the proposed Sunday Service.

They believe: 1. That the changed conditions of modern life, which have increased the population of cities and spread them over large areas, make easy and cheap transportation for the people of large towns on Sundays, as well as week days, an important social and moral consideration.

2. That it will tend to place the poor in the crowded parts of the city on something like an equality with those who can afford carriages or bicycles in maintaining intercourse with their friends, or in getting access with their children to the open air and public spaces on the only day on which many families, and especially those of working men, can enjoy them together.

3. That while the convenience to the public, and particularly to the poor, will be infinitely improved, less labor will be required proportionately for communication throughout the city by a Sunday Car Service THE BANK OF TORONTO. than is at present entailed on coachmen, cabmen and others.

4. That as the employes of the Street Railway Company are prevented by special bylaw from working more than six days in the week, and as the enforcement of this bylaw is underheavy penalties in the hands
