The biggest crowd of the week was at Thorncliffe Park yesterday. The weather was sultry, but the racegoers were a busy lot. The pools were thus the biggest of three days, appearing to average over \$20,000 a race. After Safranor, a long shot, landed the opener, four favorites won in a row. Then Thursday Nighter, at about 4 to 1, won the sixth, and Hackamore, yielding nearly 10 to 1, the last, The three beaten choices, Star Finch, Koh-I-Noor and Buckboard, finished outside the money. Jockey Butwell rode three winners. The Royal Grenadiers Band gave a fine program of music in front of the grand stand between the races.

Safranor won the first race, taking the Safranor won the first race, taking the lead a helf-furling from home after Darnay and Star Finch had raced their heads off, the favorite dropping back to last. Alf Vezina stayed for the

El Mahdi won the second without much effort. The race was for the place between Betsy and Mary Malton, the former getting it easily at the finish. Shilling had a riderless contest before the third, then was off running and stayed in front to almost defeat the favorite, but Waterwood was a good horse and Butwell steered the colt over the lot to gain a nose verdiet, Enrico Caruso alone third. Yaphank had a lot of support, but five furlongs was enough for him.

Director Dyment, Owner Harry Giddings, Sr., Trainer Harry Giddings, Jr. and Jockey Homanelli were all there from Woodbine Park when the stable mate of the King's Plate winner, Captain B, scored in the fourth race, one of the features of the day for Canadian 3-year-olds and up. The combination looked great and the speculators made the Captain a top heavy favorite, just like he performed. pion Kop won the Derby at Epsom Downs today. Lord Derby's Archaic ran second and . Neumann's Orpheus third. Nineteen

L. Neumann's Orpheus third. Nineteen horses ran.

The betting on the course was: Spion Kop, 160 to 6; Archaic, 10 to 1; Orpheus, 50 to 1.

The horses which ran were: Abbot's Trace, Allenby, Prince, Archaic, Artilus, Daylight Patrol, Dyname, Fireworks, He Goes, Kerasos, Marshal Nedl, Orpheus, Poltava, Polymetis, Sarchedon, Silvern, Spion Kop, Tetratema and Torelore. They did not finish in this order.

The winner, Captain G. Loder's bay colt Spion Kop, by Spearmint, out of Hammerkop, was trained by Gilpin, had a disappointing career as a two-year-old, never winning a race last season, and, tho he finished second in five and third in one of his six races, he was running in very moderate fields and never met the best of his year. During the winter odds of 33 to 1 were freely laid against his Derby chances.

His first win was at Kempton Park in the Speithorne Plate on May 8 last, and he then impressed many good judges by the style in which he settled his field in a few strides. The race was a mile and a half, and Polumetis, who was second, with a good winning record, could make no impression on the winner. Spion Kop's Derby price immediately shortened to 100 to 8, and perhaps the secret of his success is that he is a rare stayer and was able to wear down his field.

The defeat of Tetratema was a sad blow for the great crowd assembled on Epsom Downs, who had made of the brilliant grey colt a popular idol. Neither he nor the well-backed Allenby was in the first three.

Lord Derby's Archaic, by Polymeius-Keystone II., had a great run on him the last few days. Orpheus, by Orba-Electra, was third. The winner was trained by Gilpin.

Major McCalmont's Tetratema was the favorite of the 19 splendid entries that went to the starting barrier today in the greatest event of the British flat racing season—the Denby stakes—over the historic course of Epsom Downs. Other thorobreds in the race that were fancied were Lord Denby's Archaic, Allenby, Daylight, Patrol, Polumetis and He Goes.

The Derby, the blue ribbon event of the English turf, was run at Epsom Downs today in the presence of a crowd estimated to aggregate nearly one mil-

lion.

The favorites, Allenby and Tetramena, finished in the ruck.

In the betting, Spion Kop was 16 to to 1, and Archaic-10 to 1, while almost anywhere among the layers of odds as high, as 50 to 1 could be obtained on Orpheus. Nineteen horses faced the starter.

King Was There.

The attendance of King George and Queen Mary and numerous titled persons gave today's event the name, "the silk-hat Derby." It was declared to have been the most splendid scene on the historic race course in the memory of those present today. Field Marshal Haig, former Premier Asquith and Lords Derby, ChapMin, Durham and Londsale were with the crowds on their way to the course when his automobile broke down. Thousands of persons camped all night on the course, and at daybreak still thousands of others trooped along the various roads or came to the downs in automobiles, taxicabs, dogcarts and

automobile as a means of conveyance, numerous coaches and fours were to be seen along the roadways carrying their gaily-dressed racing enthusiasts to the

track.

The result of the race provided a windfall for the bookmakers, for enormous sums had been wagered, ranging from a shilling to hundreds of pounds, on the badly-defeated favorites. Women thronged about the bookmakers, laying heavy bets, but not patronlizing the tipsters. The tipsters, however, did a thriving business among the men.
